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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors Amber Charter School

We have audited the accompanying statements of financial position of Amber Charter School (a nonprofit organization) (the "Organization") as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of Amber Charter School's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing opinion on the effectiveness of Amber Charter School's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Amber Charter School as of June 30, 2011 and 2010, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

As discussed in Note 2 to the financial statements, as of July 1, 2009, the Organization changed its method of accounting for uncertainty in income taxes.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated October 24, 2011, on our consideration of Amber Charter School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Our audit of the 2011 financial statements was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards for the year ended June 30, 2011, is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, <u>Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations</u>, and is not a required part of the 2011 financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the 2011 financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the 2011 financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the 2011 financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the 2011 financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION

Pursuant to Article 56 of the New York State Education Law by the Board of Regents of the University of the state of New York, Amber Charter School ("Amber" or the "Organization") was incorporated on April 4, 2000, as a charter school valid for a term of five years. Charters are renewable every five years. Amber was successfully re-chartered in the spring of 2010 for an additional five years. Amber is a nonprofit, grade charter school located in the Upper Manhattan section of the city of New York, serving children in kindergarten through fifth grade. Founded by Community Association of Progressive Dominicans/Asociacion Comunal de Dominicanos Progresistas ("ACDP"), Amber is the first charter school in New York City created by a community-based organization, and the first to develop an English/Spanish two-way immersion program. Amber's mission is to provide comprehensive learning experiences that will enable all of its students to become fully educated, creative adults, prepared to take leadership roles in New York City and in our global society. To fulfil this mission, Amber attempts to prepare each of its students with the ability to demonstrate proficiency and/or distinction in all New York State Learning Standards. Amber's funding is primarily from per-student funding provided by New York City; additionally Amber receives government grants and contracts and private contributions.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Financial Statement Presentation

In the statements of activities, Amber distinguishes between contributions that increase permanently restricted net assets (subject to perpetual funding source imposed restrictions), temporarily restricted net assets (funding source-imposed restrictions have not been met) and unrestricted net assets (not subject to funding source-imposed restrictions or whose funding source-imposed restrictions have been met). As of June 30, 2011 and 2010, there were no temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP") requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist primarily of cash on deposit and money market accounts that are readily convertible into cash and purchased with original maturities of three months or less.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment, when purchased, are recorded at cost. Contributions of property and equipment are recorded at their estimated fair values at the date of contribution. Depreciation of equipment is calculated using the double declining balance method over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Maintenance and repairs are charged to operations when incurred. Expenditures that increase the value or significantly extend the lives of assets are capitalized. When property and equipment are sold or otherwise disposed of, the asset account and related accumulated depreciation account are relieved, and any gain or loss is included in operations.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Revenue Recognition

Contributions are recognized as revenue when they are unconditionally promised and are reflected as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Grants are recognized as revenue when they are unconditionally awarded.

Donations-in-kind

Contributions of donated noncash assets are recorded at their fair values at the date received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance nonfinancial assets or that require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received.

Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of functional expenses. Compensation expenses and certain other costs have been allocated by management between the programs and supporting services benefited.

Income Taxes

Effective July 1, 2009, in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification ("FASB ASC") 740, *Income Taxes*, the Organization applies the "more likely than not" threshold to the recognition and derecognition of tax positions for its financial statements. Using that guidance, the Organization had no uncertain tax positions that qualify for either recognition or disclosure in the financial statements as of June 30, 2011 or 2010.

The Organization files income tax returns in the U.S. federal jurisdiction and in the state of New York. The Organization is no longer subject to U.S. or New York State income tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2008.

NOTE 3 - TAX EXEMPT STATUS

Amber qualifies as a charitable organization as defined by Internal Revenue Code Section ("IRC") 501(c)(3) and, accordingly, is exempt from Federal income taxes. Amber is also exempt from New York State and New York City income taxes. Additionally, since Amber is a Section 509(a)(1) publicly supported organization, contributions made to Amber qualify for the maximum charitable contribution deduction under the IRC.

NOTE 4 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISKS

Amber maintains cash balances with a financial institution in New York City which routinely during 2011 and 2010, were in excess of federal insurance limits. Amber has not experienced any losses in these accounts, and management does not believe Amber is exposed to any significant credit risks with respect to cash.

Revenue from The New York City Department of Education ("NYC") accounted for 88% and 85% of total revenue and support during the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively. Federal grantor agencies accounted for 11% and 8% of total revenue and support during the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

NOTE 4 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISKS (CONTINUED)

Additionally, federal grantor agencies accounted for 99% and 97% of total grants and contracts receivable at June 30, 2011 and 2010, respectively.

NOTE 5 - NOTE PAYABLE

Amber has a \$100,000 noncommitted credit line with a major New York City bank. Borrowings under the note bear interest at the prime rate plus 1% per annum (the prime rate was 3.25% at June 30, 2011 and 2010). Borrowings were also personally guaranteed by a member of Amber's Board of Directors; however, upon the renewal of the credit line in March 2011, the guarantee was removed. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, Amber owed \$ -0-, under the credit agreement. The credit line expires in January 2012.

NOTE 6 - LONG-TERM DEBT

Long-term debt consisted of the following:

First mortgage payable to Raza Development Fund, Inc., ("Raza"),
dated June 22, 2004. The loan was collateralized by Amber's real
estate in the city of New York and guaranteed by ACDP. It was
due in monthly installments of \$19,229, including interest at 6%
per annum, with a balloon payment of approximately \$2,096,900
due at maturity on June 1, 2011. Subsequently, the loan was re-
financed (See Note 12).

Second mortgage payable to Local Initiatives Support Corporation ("LISC"), dated June 22, 2004. The loan was collateralized by Amber's real estate in the city of New York. This loan had been subordinated to the first mortgage from Raza described above. The loan was due in monthly installments of \$3,122 including interest at 6% per annum, with a balloon payment of approximately \$239,500 due at maturity on July 1, 2011. Subsequently, the loan was repaid upon the refinancing of the Raza loan (See Note 12).

NOTE 6 - LONG-TERM DEBT (CONTINUED)

In conjunction with the mortgage loan agreement with Raza (the "Raza mortgage") and the refinance agreement (See Note 12), Amber is required to maintain a debt service coverage ratio of 1.15 to 1 and certain operating and replacement reserves. At June 30, 2011 and 2010, Amber was in compliance with the debt service coverage ratio.

Pursuant to the terms of the Raza mortgage, Amber was required to maintain certain reserve account balances. Based on calculations required each year, within 30 days of the lenders receipt of Amber's most recent audited financial statements, Amber was required to supplement those reserves. For the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, the required amounts for the reserves were \$518,206 and \$279,006, respectively. In conjunction with the refinancing (see Note 12), the reserve requirements were eliminated and the amounts previously set aside by Amber were refunded in September 2011.

NOTE 9 - DONATED EQUIPMENT, MATERIAL AND SERVICES

Related Parties

A member of Amber's Board of Directors is a partner in a law firm that provides pro bono legal services to Amber. The value of the services provided to Amber was \$20,000 during the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010. Such amounts are reflected in "Management and general expenses" in the accompanying financial statements.

Others

During the year ended June 30, 2010, an unrelated party donated computers to Amber which had a fair value of \$15,043 at the date of the contribution. These amounts are reflected in "Revenue and support" in the accompanying financial statements. During the year ended June 30, 2011, there were no such contributions.

NOTE 10 - RETIREMENT PLAN

Amber sponsors a defined contribution 403(b) retirement plan covering substantially all of its full-time employees. Contributions to the plan on behalf of non-union employees are at the discretion of the Board of Directors. Contributions on behalf of union employees are in accordance with the union contract, which specified a 3% match as defined in the agreement for 2011 and 2010. For the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010, Amber contributed \$88,366 and \$84,645, respectively, to the plan.

NOTE 11 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Certain of Amber's contracts are subject to audit by the funding sources. Disallowance and adjustments, if any, resulting from such audits, will be reflected in financial statements in the year of determination.

At June 30, 2011, Amber had approximately 64 employees, of which, approximately 41 are represented by a union.

NOTE 12 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

In September 2011, Amber and Raza entered into an agreement to refinance the Raza mortgage. Part of the proceeds of the financing were used to pay off the second mortgage payable to LISC. The refinanced Raza mortgage, is payable in monthly installments of \$17,316, including interest at the rate of 7% per annum, which matures in November 2016, at which time a balloon payment of approximately \$2,300,000 is due. The loan is secured by Amber's real estate. The mortgage agreement also contains restrictive covenants, the most significant of which is maintaining a debt service coverage ratio of 1.15 to 1.

The Organization has evaluated all events or transactions that occurred after June 30, 2010, up through October 24, 2011, the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued. Except as mentioned in the preceding paragraph, no additional material subsequent events occurred that required recognition or additional disclosure in these financial statements.

NOTE 13 - RECLASSIFICATIONS

Certain amounts in the 2010 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation. The increase in net assets previously reported for 2010 was not affected by these changes.

NOTE 1 - GENERAL

The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards presents the activity of all federal financial assistance programs of Amber Charter School. All federal financial assistance received directly from federal agencies, as well as federal financial assistance passed through other government agencies, is included on the Schedules of Expenditures of Federal Awards.

NOTE 2 - BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

NOTE 3 - RELATIONSHIP TO FEDERAL FINANCIAL REPORTS

Grant expenditure reports as of June 30, 2011, which have been submitted to grantor agencies, will in some cases, differ from amounts disclosed herein. The reports prepared for grantor agencies are typically prepared on the cash basis of accounting and the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is prepared on the basis of accounting described in the preceding note 2. Under the cash basis of accounting expenses are recorded when paid rather than when incurred. The reports agree to amounts reported in the Amber Charter School's basic financial statements after adjusting from cash to accrual basis.

Amber Charter School's responses to our findings are described in the accompanying schedule. We did not audit responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on the responses.

Section III - Federal awards findings and questioned costs:

1. Condition:

Our audit disclosed two instances in which the auditee was unable to provide us with the application forms used to determine the level of benefits that a student was eligible to receive under the National School Breakfast and Lunch Program.

Criteria:

Procedures should be in place to provide reasonable assurance that documentation is maintained to support the auditee's determination of the eligibility for and the level of benefits provided to students.

Cause

The procedures in place were not adequate to ensure the maintenance of the aforementioned documentation.

Effect:

Management is unable to document the eligibility of and level of benefits provided to students.

Recommendation:

Amber should ensure that all documentation relating to a student's meeting eligibility criteria according to Federal guidelines are properly retained, either in the student's file or files established for the specific grant.

School's Response:

We believe that the eligibility for these two students were properly evaluated and the correct determinations were reached. However, during the audit we discovered that the related application forms had been misplaced.
