# KIPP NYC PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS



#### MISSION

Together with families and communities, we create joyful, academically excellent schools that prepare students with the skills and confidence to pursue the paths they choose—college, career, and beyond—so they can lead fulfilling lives and build a more just world.

#### **EDUCATION CORPORATION BACKGROUND**

KIPP NYC Public Charter Schools ("KIPP NYC Schools" or the "education corporation") is a not-for-profit charter school education corporation with the authority to operate eight charter schools, all of which are currently open. KIPP NYC Schools contracts with KIPP NYC, LLC ("KIPP NYC" or the "network"), a New York not-for-profit charter management organization that supports all KIPP NYC Schools' charters in the areas of curricular development, student assessment, student enrollment, staff member recruitment, professional development, legal compliance, external relations, financial management, and technology support. The eight schools include:

- KIPP Always Mentally Prepared Charter School ("KIPP AMP");
- KIPP Beyond Charter School ("KIPP Beyond");
- KIPP Bronx Charter School II ("KIPP Bronx II");
- KIPP Bronx Charter School III ("KIPP Bronx III");
- KIPP Freedom Charter School ("KIPP Freedom");
- KIPP Infinity Charter School ("KIPP Infinity");
- KIPP S.T.A.R. College Prep Charter School ("KIPP STAR"); and,
- KIPP Washington Heights Academy Charter School ("KIPP Washington Heights").

KIPP NYC Schools is part of a national network of schools that operate with support from the KIPP Foundation. The nonprofit KIPP Foundation trains and develops outstanding educators to lead KIPP schools; provides tools, resources, and training for excellent teaching and learning; promotes innovation; and, facilitates the exchange of insights and ideas both within the national KIPP network and with partners including other public schools, non-profit organizations, and institutions of higher learning. The KIPP Foundation shares its headquarters with the KIPP NYC office.

### RENEWAL RECOMMENDATION

#### **FULL-TERM RENEWAL**

**Renewal through 2028-29.** The SUNY Charter Schools Institute (the "Institute") recommends the SUNY Trustees' Charter Schools Committee (the "SUNY Trustees") approve the eight Applications for Charter Renewal:

- KIPP Always Mentally Prepared Charter School;
- KIPP Beyond Charter School;
- KIPP Bronx Charter School II;
- KIPP Bronx Charter School III;
- KIPP Freedom Charter School;
- KIPP Infinity Charter School;
- KIPP S.T.A.R. College Prep Charter School; and,
- KIPP NYC Washington Heights Academy Charter School;

If each school is renewed, KIPP NYC Public Charter Schools will be granted the authority to continue to operate each charter through 2028-29 with the authority to provide instruction to students in such configuration as set forth in each charter's Application for Renewal. The Institute makes this recommendation based on each charter meeting the criteria for renewal set forth in the Policies for the Renewal of Not-for-Profit Charter School Education Corporations and Charter Schools Authorized by the Board of Trustees of the State University of New York ("SUNY Renewal Policies"). <sup>1</sup>.

The Institute further recommends the SUNY Trustees renew for a full term of five years the provisional charter of KIPP NYC Public Charter Schools, the New York not-for-profit charter school education corporation.

## RENEWAL RECOMMENDATION

To earn an *Initial Full-Term Renewal*, a charter school must either:



have compiled a strong and compelling record of meeting or coming close to meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals, and have in place at the time of the renewal review an educational program that, as assessed using the Qualitative Education Benchmarks,<sup>2</sup> is generally effective; or,



have made progress toward meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals and have in place at the time of the renewal review an education program that, as assessed using the Qualitative Education Benchmarks, is particularly strong and effective.

To earn a **Subsequent Full-Term Renewal**, a charter must demonstrate that it has met or come close to meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals.

#### **REQUIRED FINDINGS**

In addition to making a recommendation based on a determination of whether the charter has met the SUNY Trustees' specific renewal criteria, the Institute makes the following findings required by the New York Charter Schools Act of 1998 (as amended, the "Act"):

- the education corporation can demonstrate the ability to operate the charter in an educationally and fiscally sound manner in the next charter term; and,

given the programs it will offer, its structure, and its purpose, approving the charter to operate for another five years is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes of the Act.<sup>3</sup>

As part of the corporate charter renewal review process and as required by Education Law §2851(4), the Institute reviewed the progress of each of the education corporation's operating schools in achieving the educational objectives set forth in their terms of operation in the education corporation's charter agreement. The Institute also reviewed detailed financial statements that disclosed the costs of administration, instruction, and other spending categories at each school operated by the education corporation. The Institute reviewed the annual reports, indications of parent and student satisfaction and organizational capacity for each of the schools. Finally, the Institute reviewed the governance structure and finances of the education corporation. Elements of the foregoing constitute the Corporate Renewal Application. Based on this review and other information submitted to the Institute and in its files, the Institute makes the following findings required by the Act:

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

KIPP NYC Schools grew significantly over the current charter term, opening four new charters and five new facilities since the 2018-19 school year. The eight KIPP NYC Schools charters under renewal review all meet or come close to meeting their academic Accountability Plan goals in English language arts ("ELA") and mathematics during their charter terms. The education corporation's high school program met its graduation and college preparation goals over the term. Notably, KIPP Infinity exceeded the targets for all available comparative and growth measures in both subjects during every year. KIPP NYC's operational, assessment, and professional development support allow school level leaders and teachers to focus on delivering the academic program and deepening community bonds. In classrooms, teachers deliver rigorous lessons that foster student independence and regularly differentiate instruction based on assessment data.

KIPP NYC Schools actively involves families in the shaping of school culture and programming. Through its Regional Family Advisory Council and Equity by Design projects, families help set the vision for academic, SEL, and enrichment coursework while setting expectations for student development over the course of their tenure at KIPP NYC Schools. KIPP NYC Schools works to retain families through a strong academic program, robust enrichment offerings, and a suite of support services for students with disabilities and English language learners ("ELLs"). On average, KIPP NYC Schools retained 85% of students across all subgroups between the 2022-23 and 2023-24 school years.

The network experienced higher than average turnover in operational positions in the most recent charter term resulting in operational challenges such as delays in financial reporting. In response, KIPP NYC restructured the network team to better support fiscal, operational, and special education supports for schools. While this work was ongoing at the time of the Institute's visit, the network anticipates that, once complete, the new organizational structure will support role clarity and horizontal and vertical alignment among school, regional, and network staff members. Ultimately, the restructuring of the network will ensure better partnership between instructional and operational teams at all levels of the organization.

KIPP NYC Schools and the network encourage each school leader to build upon the KIPP NYC model to create a unique academic program that meets the needs of the community, student body, and teachers alike.

The information below demonstrates the key findings for the SUNY Trustees and highlights the successes of the charters.

#### **FINDINGS & INFORMATION**

#### Is the education corporation an academic success?

KIPP NYC Schools maintained a strong academic program over the current charter term and all the schools under renewal consideration meet or come close to meeting their Accountability Plan goals in ELA and mathematics. The network provides resources, training, and tools for instructional leaders and teachers to assess student understanding, analyze performance, and plan lessons aligned with rigorous state standards. Instructional leaders at each site support teachers in using assessment data to plan and deliver effective Tier 1 interventions in the classroom for all students, an effective practice that positively impacts student academic outcomes. KIPP NYC Schools further demonstrates academic success in the following ways:

- Over the charter term, the education corporation outperformed the composite district in ELA by at least 12 percentage points every year;
- In both subjects, each of the eight KIPP NYC Schools posted high effect sizes indicating performance that was higher than expected to at least a meaningful degree in comparison to demographically similar schools; and
- From 2018-19 through 2022-23, the high school posted high four-year graduation rates that exceeded the absolute target of 75% and the district comparison each year. Notably in 2021-22, 92% of the 2015 Cohort graduated after four years, exceeding the district's results by 18 percentage points.

#### Is the education corporation an effective, viable organization?

KIPP NYC Schools is an effective, viable organization. The network provides schools with operational, fiscal, marketing, data, and professional development support so that school leaders and teachers can focus on delivering high quality instruction. The board maintains effective governance and continues to recruit for new membership and implement self-evaluation practices that expand its capacity to maintain effective oversight of each school and KIPP NYC.

#### Is the education corporation fiscally sound?

KIPPY NYC Schools is fiscally sound and has posted surpluses in the majority of the years in the current charter term. The education corporation reported both operating surpluses and deficits during the current charter term. The losses incurred in the 2021-22 school year are offset by large surpluses posted in the prior years. External auditors found material weaknesses in the network's internal controls over financial reporting. The network reviewed internal controls and provided updated training for staff members to address the issues that arose in the audit.

# If the SUNY Trustees renew each charter, are the education corporation's plans for each charter reasonable, feasible, and achievable?

KIPP NYC Schools' plans for the future are reasonable, feasible, and achievable. The education corporation plans to maintain the effective instructional program at each school and work toward maintaining strong enrollment at all locations over the next charter term. In the future charter term, KIPP NYC Schools will open a new high school facility to house 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade students while maintaining its 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade program at the existing high school location.

Based on the Institute's review of the education corporation's performance across each of its charters as posted over the charter term; a review of the Applications for Charter Renewal submitted by the education corporation for each of its charters; a review of academic, organizational, governance, and financial documentation; and, a renewal review of each of the charter's academic programs, the Institute finds that the education corporation and each charter within it meets the required criteria for renewal.

The Institute recommends that the SUNY Trustees grant the education corporation KIPP NYC Schools and KIPP AMP, KIPP Beyond, KIPP Freedom, KIPP STAR, and KIPP Washington Heights a Subsequent Full-Term Renewal through 2028-29, and KIPP Bronx II, KIPP Bronx III, and KIPP Infinity an Initial Full-Term Renewal through 2028-29.



# KIPP ALWAYS MENTALLY PREPARED CHARTER SCHOOL

The New York City Schools Chancellor (the "NYC Chancellor") approved the original charter for KIPP AMP in March 2005. The charter opened its doors in fall 2005, serving students in 5<sup>th</sup> grade. The SUNY Trustees approved the charter to merge under SUNY authorization effective July 1, 2019.

#### **PROGRAM**

KIPP AMP implements the same program elements of all KIPP NYC Schools' charters. For more information on the educational program, please see the Benchmark Summary in the Data Presentation section of this report.

KIPP AMP promotes an academic culture that is both data and results driven while maintaining a focus on students' social-emotional development. Leaders, alongside staff members, implement an intentional launch of the school year where students are steeped in clear expectations to facilitate a strong start to school routines while also supporting students in nurturing strong independent learner habits in the classroom. The charter's high teacher retention rate allows for the continuity of initiatives that build both student and family engagement. Families benefit from activities and workshops that build their skills in supporting students' learning as well as roles that families can play in the school community. Enrichment activities provide students with opportunities to develop new skills and talents, offering students multiple avenues for personal and academic growth and success.

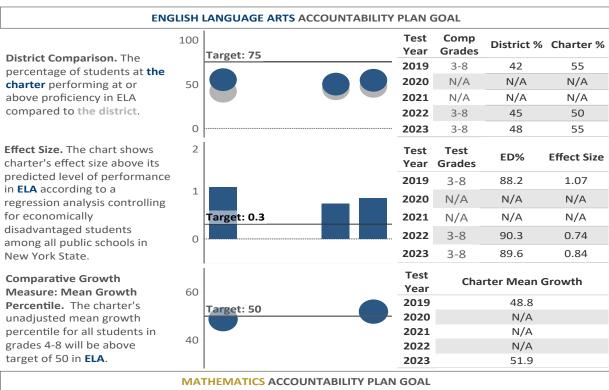

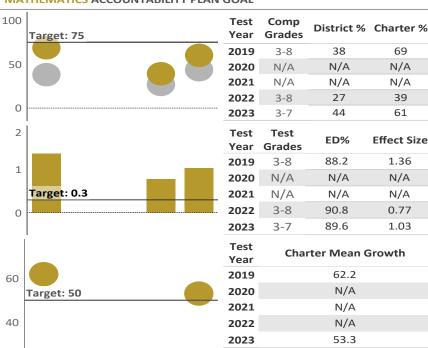

# KIPP BEYOND CHARTER SCHOOL

533 West 121st Street, New York, New York | Grades: 6-8 | Community School District 3

The SUNY Trustees approved the original charter for KIPP Beyond on March 4, 2019. KIPP Beyond opened its doors in fall 2021, serving 95 students in 6<sup>th</sup> grade.

#### **PROGRAM**

KIPP Beyond implements the same program elements of all KIPP NYC Schools' charters. For more information on the educational program, please see the Benchmark Summary in the Data Presentation section of this report.

KIPP Beyond implements a strategic recruitment plan given the presence of other high-demand middle school options in the area. School leadership has developed a Diverse by Design initiative in response to the socioeconomic diversity of the surrounding area. As part of this initiative, KIPP Beyond maintains two enrollment lotteries: one that offers 60% of its seats to students who qualify for free or reduced price lunch ("FRPL") and another that offers 40% of its seats to students who do not qualify.

The Institute is recommending an early full term renewal of three years to align the charter expiration of July 31, 2029 with the education corporation.

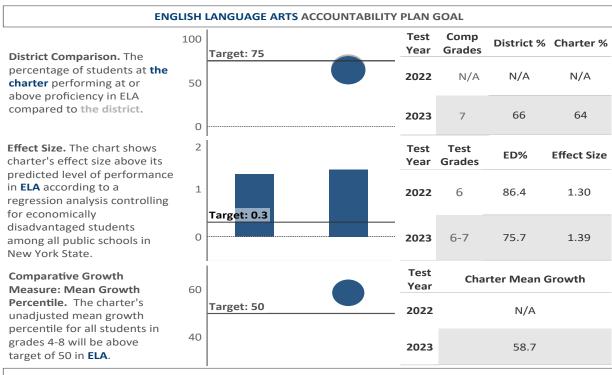

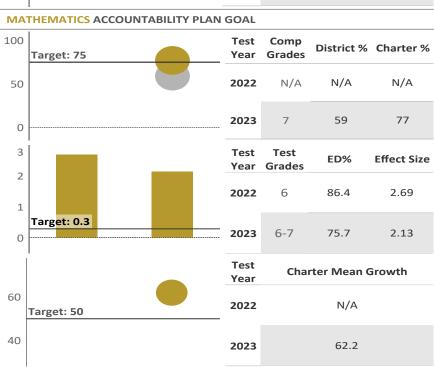

# KIPP BRONX CHARTER SCHOOL II

2720 Jerome Avenue, Bronx, New York | Grades: K-8 | Community School District 10

The SUNY Trustees approved the original charter for KIPP Bronx II on June 6, 2018. The charter opened its doors in fall 2019, serving 180 students in Kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> grade.

#### **PROGRAM**

KIPP Bronx II implements the same program elements of all KIPP NYC Schools' charters. For more information on the educational program, please see the Benchmark Summary in the Data Presentation section of this report.

KIPP Bronx II expanded rapidly for the 2023-24 school year growing from serving Kindergarten and 1st grade and 5th and 6th grade to Kindergarten – 8th grade when it moved into private space on Jerome Avenue in the Bronx. KIPP NYC provides additional operational and leadership support to KIPP Bronx II as it scales its program and continues to monitor the programs for additional support as needed. While the schools continue to work through creating routines and systems in a new space, the principals of both programs look forward to using the space to build out project based learning opportunities as well as events that prepare rising 5th grade students for the transition to middle school and give older students an opportunity to support students in the lower grades.

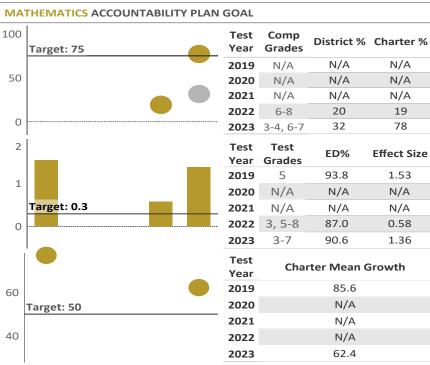

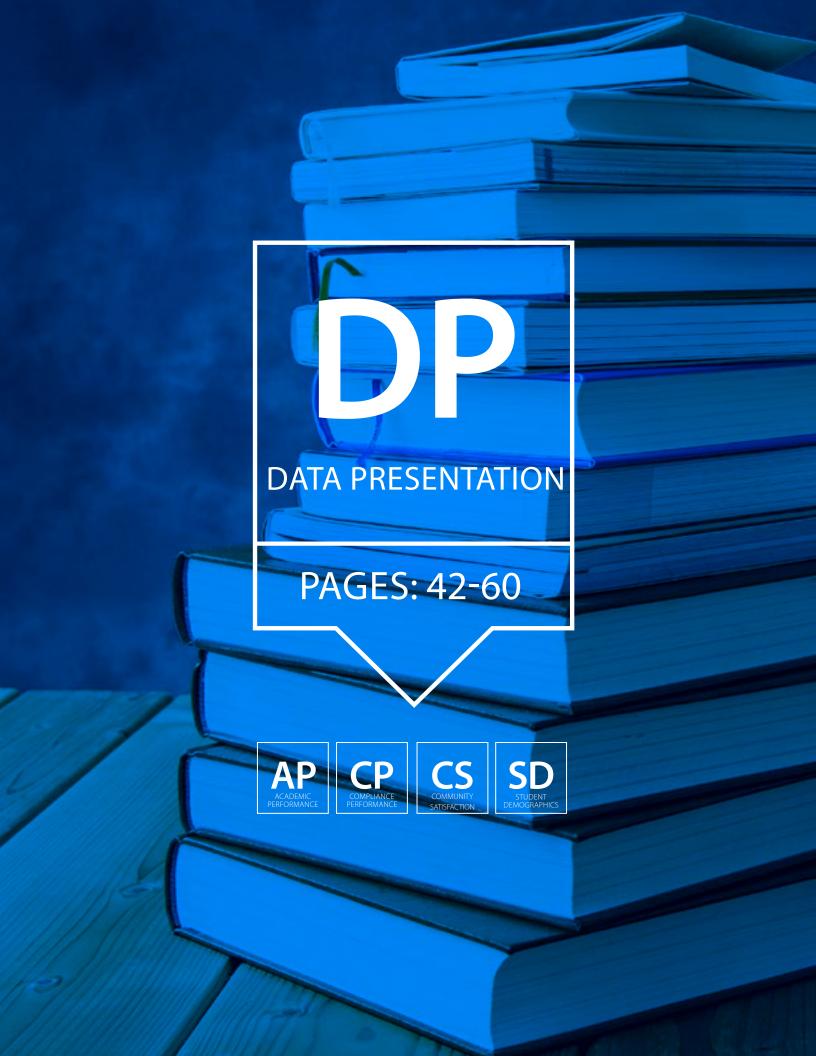

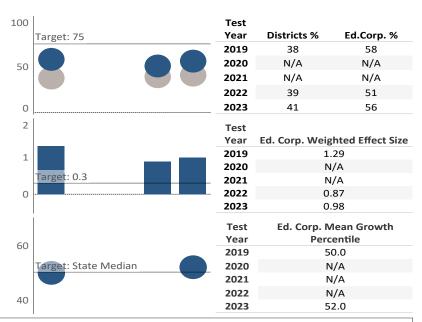

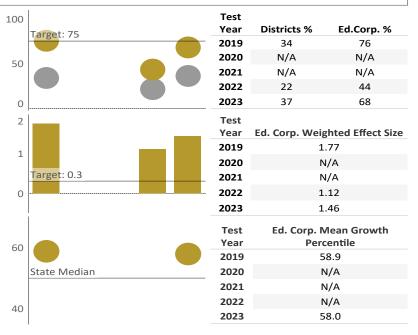

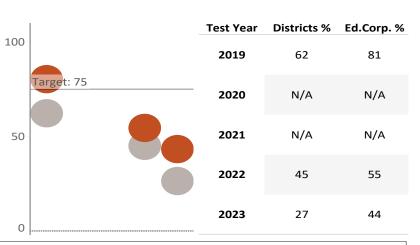

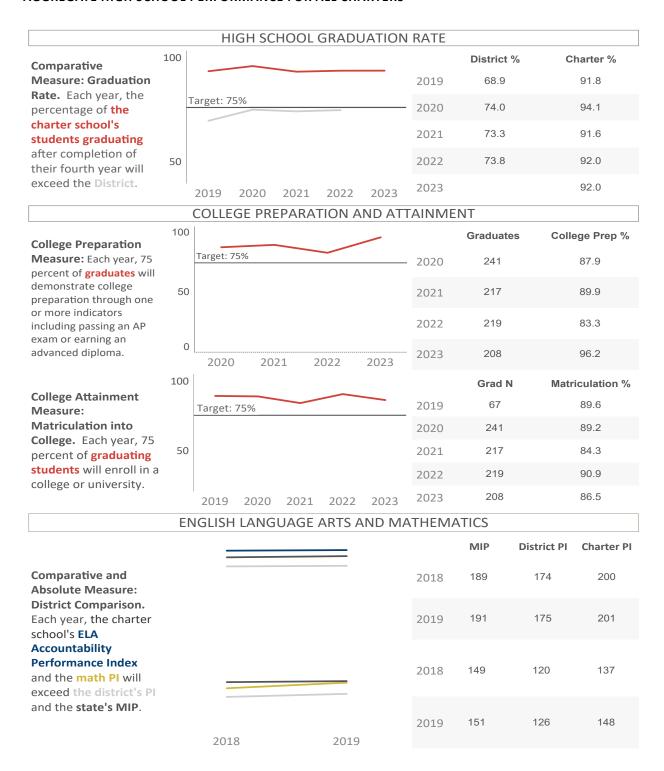

# HAS THE EDUCATION CORPORATION MET OR COME CLOSE TO MEETING ITS ACADEMIC ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN GOALS?

The eight KIPP NYC Schools charters under renewal review met or come close to meeting their academic Accountability Plan goals in ELA and mathematics during the charter term. The education corporation's high school program met its graduation and college preparation goals over the term. Notably, KIPP Infinity exceeded the targets for all available comparative and growth measures in both subjects during every year. The charters also met the science and Every Student Succeeds Act ("ESSA") goals.

Over the charter term, seven of the education corporation's eight charters outperformed their comparison district in ELA every year. Each charter also posted comparative effect sizes in ELA that exceeded the target of 0.3 each year indicating performance that was higher than expected to at least a meaningful degree in comparison to schools across the state enrolling similar percentages of economically disadvantaged students. The charters also demonstrated mean growth that exceeded or came close to the target in each year with available data.

In mathematics, each of the eight schools under the education corporation posted positive effect sizes indicating performance that was higher than expected to at least a small degree in comparison to demographically similar schools. From 2018-19 through 2022-23, the charters' students enrolled in at least their second year posted proficiency rates that were approximately the same or above the district performance from students in the same grades. Over each year with available data, all eight charter posted mean growth percentiles that exceeded the target of 50.

KIPP Infinity, the education corporation's only charter enrolling students in 12<sup>th</sup> grade, met its graduation and college preparation goals over the term. From 2018-19 through 2022-23, the charter posted high four year graduation rates that exceeded the absolute target of 75% and the district comparison in each year with available data. Notably in 2021-22, 92% of the charter's 2015 Cohort graduated after four years exceeding the district's results by 18 percentage points. KIPP Infinity also matriculated high proportions of its graduates into two and four year college programs exceeding the target of 75% by at least nine points each year. The charter also demonstrates college preparation through a variety of methods including earning a Regents diploma with advanced designation and passing an Advanced Placement ("AP") exam with a score of 3 or higher. Notably in 2021-22, 46% of the charter's graduates passed at least one AP exam and 62% earned a Regents diploma with Advanced Designation.



## **BENCHMARK SUMMARY**

#### **ASSESSMENT**

KIPP NYC Schools has a robust assessment system that improves instructional effectiveness and drives student learning. By regularly administering a variety of valid and reliable assessments throughout the school year, the education corporation effectively gathers timely academic data to inform decisions about the educational program. KIPP NYC Schools uses a suite of assessments for each content area including i-Ready, DIBELS, network-created interim assessments, and formative unit and mid-unit exams. Schools automatically collect test data using Illuminate or the assessment's adaptive online platform, and instructional leaders provide training and oversight to ensure normed scoring practices across each school and classroom. Following each assessment, the network's data and assessment team compiles results in a dashboard, which includes previous and projected growth metrics for each student. The teaching and learning team then turnkeys that data analysis to principals and instructional deans to support teachers in developing teaching strategies and responsive intervention groupings. This data response cycle occurs on a weekly basis, with more comprehensive analysis following interim and benchmark assessments each trimester.

KIPP NYC Schools' assessment dashboards are readily available to individuals at all levels of the organization, and a data driven culture is evident in the way teachers, leaders, network teams, and board members discuss goal setting and progress monitoring. The data systems allow instructional leaders to monitor individual student growth at a granular level while simultaneously providing tools to review trends across classrooms, grades, school sites, and the region as a whole. The dashboard also provides access to disaggregated student data across subpopulations. The network's data practices inform decisions on designing small groups and deploying additional instructional support to meet targeted student needs in a timely manner. School leaders also use assessment results to evaluate teacher effectiveness and identify areas of need for professional development and coaching. Each KIPP NYC Schools program routinely communicates student progress with families using weekly Powerschool and DeansList reports for academic, attendance, and behavior data, as well as regular progress reports, trimester grades, conferences, and open house events. Teachers and leaders also create and share goal cards for each student following start of year diagnostic testing in order to keep parents informed of current performance and articulate progress towards individualized goals on year-end exams.

## CURRICULUM

KIPP NYC Schools employs a highly articulated process for developing and evaluating its curriculum, and the network is effective at providing curriculum that is consistent in quality across campuses and responsive to student learning needs.

KIPP NYC provides all curricular materials to its body of schools along with a scope and sequence that identifies what to teach and when to teach it. In ELA, teachers use the internally authored Wheatley program for reading and the Baldwin program for writing. ELA lessons offer students explicit modeling of close reading techniques such as multiple reading attempts and the use of text dependent questions, along with the opportunity to refine these techniques independently. To bolster students' ability to analyze text and defend their thinking, KIPP NYC Schools offers a Socratic seminar at the end of each unit to engage students in rigorous discussion of



literary themes. In each grade, students unpack overarching literary themes by reading diverse texts related to the theme. For example, in one grade, students are exploring the concept of the American Dream, and they will generate a piece of writing around this theme while incorporating the features of a particular literary genre chosen from the texts explored previously.

In mathematics, teachers use a mixture of Eureka Math, Khan Academy and cognitively guided instruction (CGI) to meet student learning needs. For students who require additional support, teachers leverage the i-Ready adaptive learning program to provide differentiated content, and the network offers all students a variety of enrichment classes in art, music, and theater.

The majority of decisions related to the selection or revision of curriculum begin at the network level with the chief academic officer ("CAO") and a team of teaching and learning specialists ("TLS") who conduct periodic analyses of diagnostic and interim assessment data to identify learning gaps. Upon identifying the most persistent learning gaps, the team decides which research based curricular approaches to deploy to schools, and work directly with principals and managing directors ("MDs") to plan the roll out of new materials or the piloting of new curriculum at select campuses, allowing up to three years for full implementation.

TLS staff members serve as subject area curriculum specialists and oversee multiple campuses within the network reporting directly to the network CAO collaborate closely with principals and academic deans to design coaching that builds teachers' mastery of content and instructional delivery. To ensure consistency in instructional delivery across subject areas, TLS staff hold deans accountable to coaching teachers in accordance to content area goals while MDs—who oversee principals directly—hold principals accountable to providing coaching, observation feedback and professional development for teachers that is aligned to performance data.

Across subject areas, network staff provide a shared, common core aligned regional curriculum with oversight from a curriculum leadership team. However, KIPP NYC formally solicits teacher input to modify curriculum each year to foster buy-in and to remain responsive to learning needs related to instructional delivery. For example, through the KIPP NYC curriculum fellowship program, veteran teachers receive training in curriculum development and have the opportunity to revise lesson plans under the guidance of TLS staff. All teachers, regardless of experience level, have the ability to offer feedback on network curriculum at the end of each curricular unit, and the network gives teachers autonomy when modifying certain aspects of curriculum. In ELA, teachers have license to select novels, articles and plays to ensure that students receive exposure to a diversity of texts that reflect cultures both familiar and unfamiliar to them. Similarly, in mathematics, KIPP NYC Schools allows school based staff members to suggest curriculum enhancements to regional curriculum leaders. The regional curriculum team then identify and implement suggestions that have the potential to address learning needs across multiple campuses. To monitor the quality of teacher input within instructional design, teachers must demonstrate positive trends in assessment data to principals and academic deans before new curricular components can undergo directorial review at the network level on the path to becoming formally instituted.

The majority of teachers at KIPP NYC Schools partake in structured intellectual preparation ("IP") routines to increase capacity to address student misconceptions arising during instruction, and the type of IP protocol varies by campus or subject area. Instructional leadership requires teachers to possess a strong



understanding of the main concepts of each curricular unit, and to make this understanding visible within each lesson plan. Leadership may also require newer teachers to practice teaching lessons for feedback before instructing students. In co-taught classrooms, special education teachers follow a specific IP template designed for students with disabilities. To ensure the effectiveness of IP approaches, teachers meet regularly to examine student work and assessment results to decide which areas still need support while refining instructional approaches accordingly. Many KIPP NYC Schools' programs offer workshops to assist parents with understanding content, building their capacity to support students with homework.

KIPP NYC Schools' curriculum development practices align closely to organizational values pertaining to innovation and a focus on positive, long-term life outcomes for students. Staff at all levels of the organization engage in structured continuous improvement cycles that use assessment results, teacher feedback and educational research to inform the selection curricular content, and the network effectively oversees its curricular development processes while affording its schools with autonomy and flexibility to ensure effective implementation of new practices.

# PEDAGOGY

High quality instruction is evident throughout KIPP NYC Schools. Teachers consistently deliver purposeful lessons with objectives aligned to the network's comprehensive curricular materials. Although teachers have autonomy to make adjustments to lessons to enhance engagement and foster connections to students' experiences, KIPP NYC Schools establishes clear expectations to ensure instruction is consistent with the rigor of the state standards across all classrooms. Teachers frequently use varied techniques to check for student understanding, including leveraging small group instruction, hand signals, circulation, and individual conferencing. In most lessons, teachers identify and address misconceptions during the lesson to ensure student understanding. Although some lessons include opportunities to challenge students with higher order thinking questioning and problem solving activities, leaders are actively focusing on establishing classroom routines and culture so that rigorous classroom activities can be implemented with greater fidelity and success. Teachers maximize learning time with efficient transitions and routines, concise directions, focused lessons, and clear communication of behavioral expectations. While some teachers have built upon the strong cultural foundations present in KIPP NYC Schools to challenge students and develop greater depth of understanding, there is an opportunity to further support teachers in facilitating effective student to student discourse. KIPP NYC instructional leaders have mapped the professional development pathway to support teachers in improving classroom rigor over the course of the year.

# INSTRUCTIONAL LEADERSHIP

KIPP Charter Schools has strong instructional leadership that focuses network and school level team members on data driven student outcomes. Network level goals are set annually, which drive school-based priorities. Principals serve as the instructional leaders in their buildings and set the vision and high expectations for teacher performance. School leaders effectively define schoolwide priorities and work with instructional deans to coach and support teachers to meet the pedagogical expectations necessary to move students academically.



Leaders foster a strong adult culture of continuous improvement as managing directors coach principals and principals provide the same level of coaching and support to instructional deans. In turn, principals and deans continue the spiral of support by coaching and providing regular feedback to teachers.

Student assessment data are made readily available to school leaders and teachers. Managing directors play the pivotal role of unpacking student performance trends with principals so that they can turnkey to teachers. Findings in student performance data drive targeted professional development topics as well as the lenses for upcoming teacher coaching and observations cycles. While professional development sessions are facilitated by principals and deans, network level instructional leaders at times visit schools to provide additional support in order to expand professional development offerings. Coaching, observation and feedback cycles are differentiated to meet the experience and growth needs of both deans and teachers. Multiple teachers reported having regular, impactful formal and informal observations, which are quickly followed up by written feedback. KIPP NYC has built a nurturing adult culture where feedback is developmental and not seen as intrusive, including "in-game coaching" where leaders provide teachers with real-time feedback and direction in the midst of a lesson.

Intellectual prep, where teachers use dedicated time to unpack, differentiate, and practice lessons, is a network-wide expectation. During common planning time, grade team leaders are instrumental in supporting teachers with modifying lessons and developing data-driven methods of responding to student learning gaps. A key criterion in a KIPP NYC Schools teachers' evaluation is their ability to create high-quality lesson plans that are customized and annotated to meet the unique needs of their students, incorporating grouping and other instructional strategies. Teachers are held accountable for their students' academic achievement through annual evaluations.

### AT-RISK PROGRAM

KIPP NYC Schools delivers high-quality educational programming that meets the varied needs of students with disabilities, ELLs, and those struggling academically. Network staff members and school leaders use the network's robust data and assessment systems to identify students in need of additional support. Schools implement a response to intervention ("RTI") program that provides tiered support to students based on DIBELS, SFA, interim, and i-Ready assessment data. The network provides ongoing professional development to teachers in delivering Tier 1 and Tier 2 interventions in the general education classroom including annual and quarterly training to content teachers and specialists on differentiation and co-teaching strategies. Instructional deans at each school, with the support of the network TLS and special education teams, support teachers in analyzing assessment data, planning student groups and interventions, and monitoring student progress. Systems and procedures are particularly strong in elementary school grade bands, where, at the time of the visit, Institute staff members observed instructional deans support teachers and integrated co-teaching ("ICT") teachers in planning Tier 1 and Tier 2 literacy interventions based on recent performance data. The strength of KIPP NYC Schools' RTI systems is also evidenced by the network's early implementation of literacy groups and station teaching. While the network had yet to finish mathematics benchmark assessments at the time



of the visit, mathematics interventions follow the literacy intervention model. Each site has a student support team ("SST") composed of the director of student support services ("DS3"), special education coordinator, interventionists, special education teacher support services ("SETSS") teachers, social workers, and other school leaders who meet regularly to review student progress and identify students for more intensive Tier 3 interventions.

KIPP NYC restructured the regional and network special education teams to more clearly delineate compliance and instructional responsibilities. At most sites, special education coordinators interface with the committee on special education ("CSE") and support compliance tasks allowing DS3s to observe, coach, and provide curricular support to interventionists and SETSS teachers. Regional DS3s, directors of social work, psychology, mental health, and literacy coaches support building level staff in delivering the at-risk program. To ensure at-risk services align with the network's academic program, the managing director of student support reports to the chief academic officer and teaching and learning team.

KIPP NYC Schools' programs identify English language learners ("ELLs") through the home language questionnaire and New York State identification test for English language learners ("NYSITELL"). Regional ELL support staff members use NYSITELL and other assessment data to identify students with an entering, emerging, transitioning or commanding hold of the English language. The network provides weekly one to one or small group English instruction to entering and emerging students to pre-teach classroom content and support vocabulary acquisition. The network provides immersion supports through its RTI program for transitioning and commanding ELL students.

# ORGANIZATIONAL CAPACITY

All aspects of the infrastructure of KIPP NYC Schools work together effectively to deliver the educational program. Both instructional and non-instructional school leaders adequately support staff members in implementing the academic program, under the guidance of network-level leaders. High staff retention rates provide consistency for students and staff members alike. The leadership development programs within the network provide opportunities for internal principals and directors of operations to be nurtured and trained, allowing them to uphold the KIPP NYC Schools culture for students and the wider school community.

School leaders and staff members are intentional in acclimating students to routines and procedures at the start of the school year and the school environment is strengthened by clear expectations in student. The focus on social-emotional learning drives adults to support students in engaging in restorative conversations as a developmental approach to responding to student behaviors. Extracurricular activities at KIPP NYC Schools' campuses provide students with a well-rounded experience that builds talents and schools other than those learned via academic instruction. Examples of extracurricular activities across KIPP NYC Schools include music, visual arts, graphic design, choir, dance, step, theater, spoken word, and various sports.

One way in which KIPP NYC Schools maintains a focus on staff member satisfaction is via the provision of robust compensation and benefits packages. Network leaders are intentional in ensuring that all staff members are equipped with the resources needed to support the achievement of goals. While there are standard supplies



and materials that each school is equipped with, principals have discretional funds that are used to procure items unique to their schools' contexts. This example showcases how KIPP NYC Schools' leaders are urged and encouraged to foster environments that respond to the needs, cultures, and circumstances of their staff and students.

KIPP NYC Schools maintains adequate student enrollment across the network. Network and school teams work collaboratively to plan and implement strategies to recruit new students to the community. Over the past year, KIPP NYC's student recruitment efforts benefited from working with an outside firm to analyze the neighborhoods served and the motivating factors for prospective families. By leveraging the insights gathered from the assessment, the network was able to tailor its outreach strategies to better appeal to the needs and preferences of families that the network hopes to reach and serve.

### **BOARD OVERSIGHT & GOVERNANCE**

KIPP NYC Schools' board effectively supports and oversees KIPP NYC's services in a manner that centers student outcomes and school staff members' needs. While small, the KIPP NYC Schools board members possess finance, marketing, and community expertise that allows them to oversee daily operation of the education corporation.

At the time of the visit, the board was in the final stages of approving two new board members after a rigorous screening process that included school visits and interviews with school leaders, students, and board members. While the screening process is an initial hurdle to board participation, approved members are mission aligned and committed to the organization for long periods of time.

The board regularly collaborates with the board members of other organizations that support the KIPP NYC schools including KIPP Foundation and KIPP NYC boards. The KIPP NYC and KIPP NYC Schools boards meet concurrently and leverage the expertise of members across both boards when strategic planning and making decisions. KIPP NYC regularly reports fiscal, academic, co-academic, real estate, and personnel data to the board through access to reporting dashboards and the KIPP NYC Schools board uses these data to support the development of priorities, long range goals, and tools to evaluate the CEO.

KIPP NYC Schools' board members are active participants in the larger KIPP NYC community. KIPP NYC shares community events and school calendars with board members, and members regularly visit schools and attend family and caregiver meetings and community events.

Current board members had not completed a recent self-evaluation at the time of the Institute's visit but were in the early stages of planning 360 reviews for the board chair and other board members.



# **COMPLIANCE REPORTING**



# HAS EACH CHARTER DUE FOR RENEWAL SUBSTANTIALLY COMPLIED WITH APPLICABLE LAWS, RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND PROVISIONS OF ITS CHARTER?

The education corporation substantially complies with applicable laws, rules and regulations, and provisions of its charter. During the current charter term, the education corporation demonstrates a clear record of compliance with the terms of its charter including the timely submission of required reporting to the Institute.

## KIPP NYC PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS

#### **Annual Reports**

The education corporation submitted its annual reports to the Institute and NYSED on time and has posted portions of the annual reports on its website. The education corporation has not incorporated the Accountability Plan Progress Reports and annual financial audits in its postings in accordance with the charter and the Act. The Institute will ensure compliance prior to the start of the next charter term.

# Interest

Code of Ethics/Conflict of At the time of the renewal submission, the education corporation's code of ethics and conflicts of interest policies were missing several required components. The Institute is working with the education corporation to ensure a more comprehensive policy is adopted.

#### **FOIL**

The education corporation does not have a Freedom of Information Law ("FOIL") subject matter list with a link to the Committee on Open Government available on its website. The Institute will work with the education corporation to update the subject matter list prior to the next charter term.

# **Teacher Certification**

The New York State Charter Schools Act of 1998 (the "Act") allows charters to hire up to 15 uncertified lead teachers contingent upon those teachers meeting certain requirements including: two years of Teach for America experience; three years of teaching experience; status as a higher education professor; exceptional experience in a subject; or, teaching science, technology, engineering, and mathematics or career and technical education courses.

KIPP NYC prioritizes hiring teachers with certification or those on a pathway toward certification. Once hired, the team tracks the progress of each teacher in a database, and meets with them regularly to ensure they understand next steps. With the help of the NYC Charter School Center, KIPP NYC partners with Relay Graduate School of Education and provides tuition assistance. KIPP NYC's staff handbook clearly outlines expectations, assistance, and consequences for current staff members who are not certified.



# **COMPLIANCE REPORTING**

At KIPP AMP, 35 out of the 64 teachers are uncertified, which is 20 teachers over the allowable limit under the Act. A total of four out of the 35 uncertified teachers do not meet the additional qualifications under the Act.

At KIPP Beyond, nine out of the 19 teachers are uncertified, which is within the allowable limit under the Act. All of the uncertified teachers meet the additional qualifications under the Act.

At KIPP Bronx II, 32 out of the 56 teachers are uncertified, which is 17 teachers over the allowable limit under the Act. A total of six out of the 32 uncertified lead teachers do not meet the additional qualifications under the Act.

At KIPP Bronx III, 61 out of the 107 teachers are uncertified, which is 46 teachers over the allowable limit under the Act. A total of 13 out of the 61 uncertified teachers do not meet the additional qualifications under the Act.

At KIPP Freedom, 19 out of the 37 teachers are uncertified, which is four teachers over the allowable limit under the Act. All of the uncertified teachers meet the additional qualifications under the Act.

At KIPP Infinity, 31 out of the 127 teachers are uncertified, which is 16 teachers over the allowable limit under the Act. A total of four out of the 31 uncertified teachers do not meet the additional qualifications under the Act.

At KIPP STAR, 20 out of the 53 teachers are uncertified, which is five teachers over the allowable limit under the Act. All of the uncertified teachers meet the additional qualifications under the Act.

At KIPP NYC Washington Heights, 20 out of the 58 teachers are uncertified, which is five teachers over the allowable limit under the Act. A total of five out of the 20 uncertified teachers do not meet the additional qualifications under the Act.



To report on parent satisfaction with the charter's program, the Institute used satisfaction survey data, information gathered from a focus group of parents representing a cross section of students, and data regarding persistence in enrollment.

#### **Parent Survey Data**

The Institute compiled data from the New York City DOE 2022-23 family satisfaction survey. In 2022-23, 21% of families who received the survey responded. Of the families who responded, 94% expressed satisfaction with the charters. Given the low response rate, the Institute recognizes that these results may not be representative of the entire KIPP NYC Schools' community. For the KIPP Infinity high school program, families completed a separate, KIPP NYC Schools created survey and families did not complete the NYCDOE survey.

In 2022-23, 18% of KIPP AMP families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety-two percent expressed overall satisfaction with the charter.

In 2022-23, 56% of KIPP Beyond families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety-five percent expressed overall satisfaction with the charter.

In 2022-23, 21% of KIPP Bronx II families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety-four percent expressed satisfaction with the charter.

In 2022-23, 2% of KIPP Bronx III families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety percent expressed satisfaction with the charter.

In 2022-23, 25% of KIPP Freedom families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety-four percent expressed satisfaction with the charter.

In 2022-23, 9% of KIPP Infinity families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety-three percent expressed satisfaction with the charter. The participation rate for KIPP Infinity is lower due to  $9^{th}-12^{th}$  grade students completing a separate survey for the high school program. For the high school program, 41 families of students completed the KIPP NYC Schools' high school program survey with 90% of families expressing satisfaction.

In 2022-23, 21% of KIPP STAR families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety-four percent expressed satisfaction with the charter.

In 2022-23, 16% of KIPP Washington Heights families responded to the NYC DOE survey. Ninety-seven percent expressed satisfaction with the charter.



#### **Parent Focus Group**

The Institute asks all charters facing renewal to convene a representative set of parents for a focus group discussion. A representative set includes parents of students in attendance at the charter for multiple years, parents of students new to the charter, parents of students receiving general education services, parents of students with special needs, and parents of ELLs. In a recent focus group with parents representing a sample of schools within the KIPP NYC Schools network, the Institute found that parents possess high levels of satisfaction across school culture domains pertaining to academics, enrichment activities, social emotional support, and community building.

Parents overwhelmingly report that KIPP NYC Schools helps students build resilience, confidence, and persistence when achieving academic goals, and that expectations for student performance are consistently rigorous. Parent feedback also indicates that KIPP NYC Schools has strong communication practices when interacting with families. For instance, parents cite that it is common to form relationships with all school staff and that teachers make themselves readily accessible to answer questions while also keeping parents informed via regular progress reports. Focus group participants also characterized teachers as having genuine concern for children, offering anecdotes about teachers who check in with students who have matriculated into college or provide remote tutoring to former students who have moved out of state.

To foster community between families and schools, each campus has its own parent organization that offers diverse types of programming such as social emotional support for parents and students, financial assistance, and fundraising. KIPP NYC Schools recently expanded this parent organization model to establish a regional council that gives families a platform to share how network programming impacts their children. The work of the regional council then helps to inform agenda items for network leadership meetings. For example, one parent discussed how network level leadership asked the council for input related to the design of social studies curriculum.

Many parents report that they highly value the external partnerships that KIPP NYC Schools has formed in accordance with its graduate aims mission. For example, KIPP NYC Schools has formed an alliance with the Reach program, which prepares students to compete for scholarships offered by selective private high schools. Parents also named that KIPP NYC Schools has exceeded their expectations in terms of support provided to students with disabilities, citing that special education leadership partners with behavioral health providers such as Northside Center to offer a wider range of supports for students with autism.

## **Public Comments**

In accordance with the Act, the Institute notified the district in which the charter is located regarding the Application for Charter Renewal. The full text of any written comments received from the district appears below, which also includes a summary of any public comments.



The NYCDOE held its required hearing on KIPP AMP's renewal application on October 19, 2023 by videoconference. The principal spoke about the school's increase in proposed enrollment and recent academic growth on state exams. The principal also spoke to the school's art program and how student artwork has been displayed at the Metropolitan Museum of Art and how the jazz club was recently in the news for its excellent performance. Nine parents and grandparents spoke in support of the application and praised the school's afterschool programs such as band, dance, theater, music, and cheerleading. They also praised the teachers, Parent Family Association, small classroom settings, and curriculum. Parents also noted that the school is a cornerstone in the community and partners with local organizations for food and clothing drives. Their children are excited to go to school and KIPP AMP has given them a chance to dream and to go to college. A local senator spoke against the application, alleging it will be harder for the co-located district school to decrease class sizes in compliance with state legislation if KIPP AMP is allowed to expand.

The NYCDOE held its required hearing on KIPP Beyond's renewal application on October 23, 2023 by videoconference. The principal spoke about the school's strong partnership with students' families through events such as curriculum nights which allow families to provide feedback about the books being read in school and other topics such as navigating the high school application process. The principal also shared how students outperformed the district passage rates for both ELA and math last year on state exams despite their district being one of the highest-performing districts in New York City. Another leader at the school highlighted the school's strong afterschool programs such as sailing and cheerleading and its work in social-emotional learning. One parent spoke in support of the application and praised the school's unique focus on middle school development for its students and providing elite opportunities to inner-city youth. No one spoke in opposition to the application.

The NYCDOE held its required hearing on KIPP Bronx II's renewal application on October 25, 2023 by videoconference. The elementary school principal spoke in support of the application and highlighted the school's small learning groups throughout the day and partnerships with the families, allowing them to feel empowered to support their children at home and in school. The principal of the middle school also spoke in support of the application and spoke about her journey from being a KIPP student to a founding principal at KIPP. The school collaborates with students, staff, and families and works to affirm who each individual student is. Over 80% of the staff at the middle school are from the Bronx and serve the school community in the Bronx. Three parents spoke in support of the school's application and shared that their children have excelled academically at the school and they appreciate how communicative the teachers and staff are. One parent shared that their child's speech has greatly improved through the school's speech therapy services. No one spoke in opposition to the application.



The NYCDOE held its required hearing on the KIPP Bronx III's renewal application on October 25, 2023 by videoconference. The middle school principal spoke about the school's commitment to ensuring students can be their authentic selves and implementing restorative practices. The principal also discussed the increase of students with IEPs and establishing programs to support students and their families. The elementary school principal spoke in support of the application and highlighted the school's culture of learning and growing and partnerships with families. The school also works to make sure students have what they need academically, socially, and emotionally to thrive, such as partnering with the family association for food drives. Three parents spoke in support of the application and spoke about improved grade point averages for their children and the very warm and welcoming environment at the school. No one spoke in opposition to the application.

The NYCDOE held its required hearing on KIPP Freedom's renewal application on October 25, 2023 by videoconference. The middle school principal spoke about one of the school's core values of community contribution and how students are encouraged to participate in leadership programs with community organizations in order to use their voices to improve their community. The principal also highlighted the school's course offerings in visual arts, dance, financial literacy, global history, algebra, and advisory period which allows students to explore different cultures and their own identities. Another school leader spoke in support of the application and mentioned the students' mastery of language and math and how the school and network foster career growth for teachers. The leader spoke of the school's support of students with disabilities through intervention, small group learning, and working with families to ensure students have all the academic support they need. Two parents spoke in support of the application speaking to the school's strong academics and positive school community. No one spoke in opposition to the application.

The NYCDOE held its required hearing on the KIPP Infinity's renewal application on October 23, 2023 by videoconference. The principal of the elementary school spoke in support of the application and emphasized the school supports the whole child through its values, social-emotional learning, and restorative practices. The principal of the middle school also spoke in support of the application and discussed how seven KIPP Infinity alumni are now teachers, leaders, and staff at the school and how the school continues to work with families and the community to ensure a safe learning environment for the students. The principal also shared that the school collaborates with its co-located district school for afterschool activities and other opportunities throughout the year. Six parents spoke in support of the application and appreciated the school's afterschool programs such as musical instrument and sport offerings, affiliations with outside organizations, ability to foster a strong community, academic rigor, support of parents and families, and great teachers and staff. No one spoke in opposition to the application.



The NYCDOE held its required hearing on KIPP STAR's renewal application on October 23, 2023 by videoconference. The elementary school principal spoke in support of the application and highlighted the school's commitment to being a community partner through clothing, food, and toy drives with local organizations as well as partnering with the local police precinct. The middle school principal also spoke in support of the application and discussed how the school promotes student and family empowerment through programs such as student council, a Justice League which helps students navigate conflict resolution, and the Parent Family Council which encourages families to be involved in the school. The principal also spoke to the school's strong academic achievements in reading and math and its ability to provide personalized instruction to support student achievement. An alumni and current leader at the school spoke in support of the application and highlighted the school's programs, club offerings, Parent Teacher Association, and open communications with parents. No one spoke in opposition to the application.

The NYCDOE held its required hearing on KIPP Washington Heights' renewal application on October 23, 2023 by videoconference. The principal of the elementary school spoke about different events for the students and families such as "Flutterfest," a weekly celebration for students doing an amazing job in class and in the community, family engagement nights, and bimonthly coffee and conversation events with parents. The principal also discussed taking students on outings at the Sugar Hill Museum and Highbridge Park, which are located within the community, giving students a sense of pride in their community. The principal also highlighted the school exceeded the district average on state exams and the school has a higher-than-average proportion of students with exceptionalities. Three parents spoke in support of the application and shared their sense of pride and gratitude for the school and its academic history, teachers and staff, and community. No one spoke in opposition to the application.

Persistence in Enrollment An additional indicator of parent satisfaction is persistence in enrollment. In 2022-23, 85% of KIPP NYC Schools students returned from the previous year. Student persistence data from previous years of the charter term is available in student demographics section of the report.

The Institute derived the statistical information on persistence in enrollment from its database. No comparative data from the NYCDOE or the New York State Education Department ("NYSED") is available to the Institute to provide either district or statewide context.

# STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

#### **ENROLLMENT AND RETENTION TARGETS**

As required by Education Law § 2851(4)(e), a charter must include in its renewal application information regarding the efforts it will put in place to meet or exceed SUNY's enrollment and retention targets for students with disabilities, ELLs, and students who are eligible applicants for the federal Free and Reduced Price Lunch ("FRPL") program. The Institute examines each school's progress toward meeting or coming close to meeting its targets over the charter term as well as the efforts it has and will put in place to meet or continue to meet those targets.

KIPP NYC Schools makes good faith efforts to meet its enrollment and retention targets. The education corporation meets or approaches targets for all subgroups of students. KIPP NYC Schools and KIPP NYC plan to conduct the following recruitment efforts to meet its enrollment and retention targets:

- Advertising KIPP NYC Schools in online and print advertisements including newsprint, billboards, bus ads, and online ads;
- Engaging in on-the-ground canvassing efforts often led by KIPP NYC Schools alumni;
- Using systems for tracking and predicting enrollment to inform how to increase enrollment efforts for specific schools; and,
- Enrolling students through family ambassador referrals.



# IS THE EDUCATION CORPORATION FISCALLY SOUND?

KIPP NYC Public Charter Schools is fiscally sound as are all eight charters under the education corporation under consideration, based on the Institute's analysis of the fiscal evidence collected through the renewal review. The SUNY Fiscal Dashboard presents color-coded tables and charts indicating that each charter up for renewal and the education corporation have demonstrated fiscal soundness over the majority of the charter term.<sup>4</sup>

The fiscal dashboard for each charter and the education corporation can be found at the end of this section. The discussion that follows relates mainly to the KIPP NYC Public Charter Schools education corporation because a charter is not a legally distinct fiscal entity.



KIPP NYC supports all of the KIPP NYC Schools' charters in the areas of curriculum, student evaluation, recruiting, training, professional development, financial management, technology, and real estate under the terms of a management contract that reflects a 12% management fee over the charter term.

The education corporation has reported both operating surpluses and deficits during the current charter term. The losses incurred in the 2021-22 school year are offset by large surpluses posted totaling more than \$8 million in the prior years. The education corporation benefits from a combined balance sheet, which is a combination of individual school's assets and liabilities. In the renewal process, the Institute tracks each individual school's expenses and revenues to report any surpluses and deficits. The combined education fiscal dashboard reflects fiscally strong with 0.9 months of cash on hand to pay current liabilities and posted total net assets of \$23 million as of June 30, 2023. KIPP NYC Schools has maintained and adequately funded the required amount in a separate escrow account in case of dissolution.

The education corporation reviews and updates its Financial Policies and Procedures Manual ("FPPM"), which covers the charter, on a regular basis. The most recent review of the FPPM is found in the next column. The Institute recommends, as a best practice, that the FPPM be reviewed and updated on an annual basis.

AUGUST 2023

In the most recent audit for KIPP Schools NYC, auditors noted a material weakness in internal controls over financial reporting. KIPP Schools NYC did not consistently follow timely and accurate account reconciliations in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles ("GAAP") prior to the audit. This led to an impact on financial statements that include an increase in liabilities and change in net assets of \$2,176,021. The audit firm recommended that the education corporation evaluate all general ledger account balances to reflect appropriate interim and year-end balances prior to the commencement of any future audit. The audit firm recommends KIPP NYC Schools evaluate all new transactions for proper recording under GAAP. Since the auditor issued the findings, KIPP NYC Schools' finance team has reviewed their internal controls and provided updated training for staff members to address the issues that arose in the audit.

KIPP NYC Schools is an academic success supported by an effective, viable organization. The education corporation is fiscally sound and presents sound financial plans. The schools, with the support of the network, will continue implementing the successful academic program across all schools. As such, KIPP NYC Schools' plans for the next charter term are reasonable, feasible, and achievable.

# KIPP NYC PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS

**Plans for the Charter's Structure.** The education corporation has provided all of the key structural elements for a charter renewal and those elements are reasonable, feasible, and achievable.

**Plans for Board Oversight & Governance.** KIPP NYC Schools board members plan to continue to serve in the next charter term. The board will continue to recruit new membership to expand its capacity to provide oversight and governance.

**Fiscal & Facility Plans.** KIPP NYC Schools, as well as each charter, has provided future budgets that are reasonable and achievable. The current year budget also includes some reserves for every charter, as well as a \$2 million CMO contingency. Additionally, there is an emergency \$500,000 reserve for facilities, should it be needed. Overall, even after including the reserves, net income for the combined charters exhibits a surplus for the 2023-24 school year.

**Plans for the Educational Program.** KIPP AMP plans to implement the same core elements of its educational program that enabled the charter to meet or come close to meeting its key Accountability Plan goals in the current charter term.

**Facility Plans.** KIPP AMP serves its Kindergarten – 8<sup>th</sup> grade program in a NYCDOE co-located facility at 1224 Park Place, Brooklyn. The site has been approved by the Panel for Education Policy, and the education corporation is confident the school will have the opportunity to remain in the current space for the full course of the new charter term.

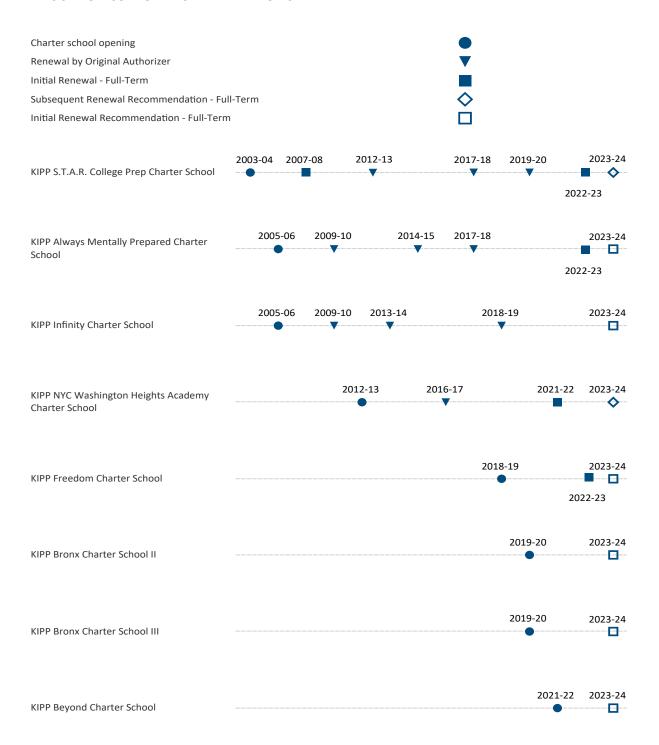

# **EDUCATION CORPORATION TIMELINE OF CHARTER RENEWAL**



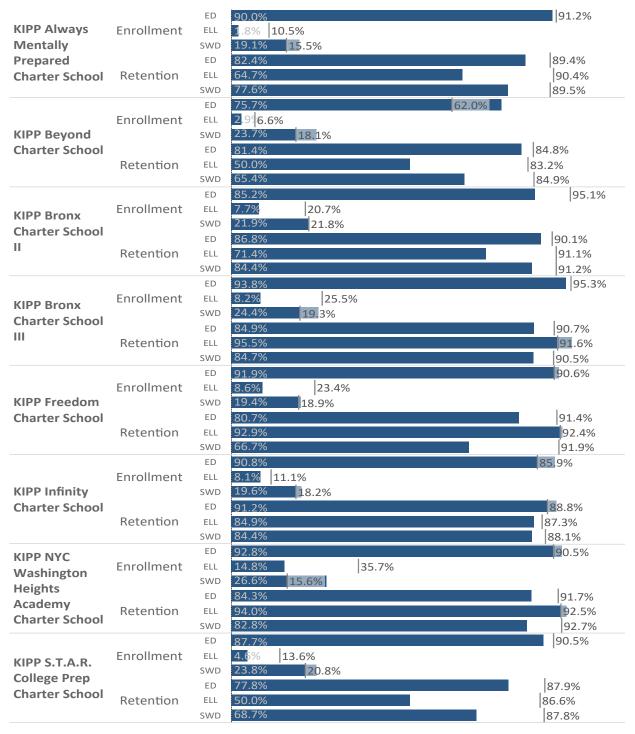

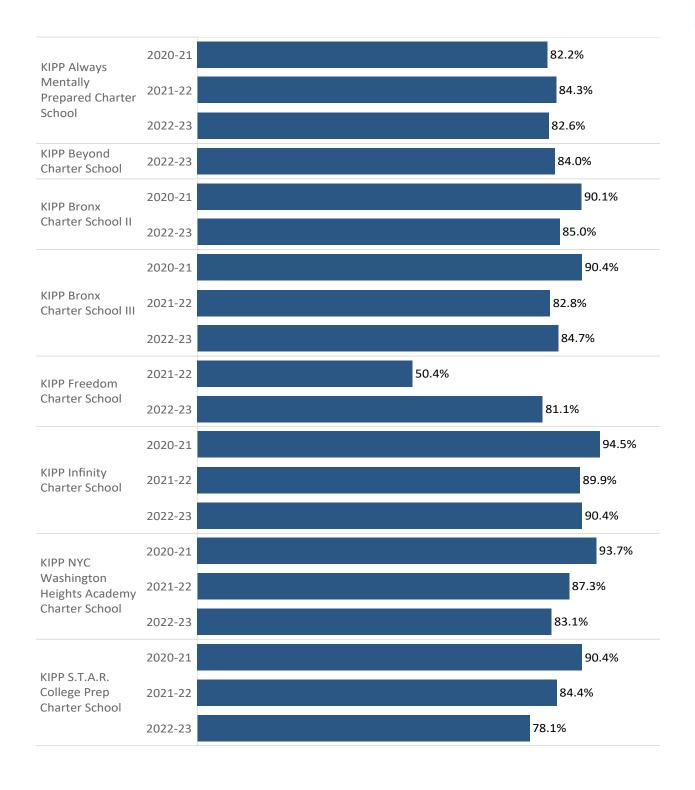
# **ENROLLMENT AND RETENTION TARGETS**

# IS THE SCHOOL AN ACADEMIC SUCCESS? THE INFORMATION BELOW HIGHLIGHTS THE INSTITUTE'S AND SUNY TRUSTEES' APPROACH TO ACCOUNTABILITY PLANS FOR EACH SUNY AUTHORIZED CHARTER SCHOOL.

At the beginning of the Accountability Period,<sup>3</sup> the school developed and adopted an Accountability Plan that set academic goals for performance in the key subjects of ELA and mathematics, as well as science and the federal Every Student Succeeds Act ("ESSA"). High school Accountability Plans also include goals for High School Graduation, College Preparation, and Social Studies. For each goal in the Accountability Plan, specific outcome measures define the level of performance necessary to meet that goal. The Institute examines results for all required Accountability Plan measures to determine goal attainment. The Act requires charters be held "accountable for meeting measurable student achievement results"<sup>4</sup> and states the educational programs at a charter school must "meet or exceed the student performance standards adopted by the board of regents"<sup>5</sup> for other public schools. SUNY's required accountability measures rest on performance as measured by statewide assessments. Historically, SUNY's required measures include measures that present schools':

Absolute, comparative, and growth achievement provide a basis for triangulating school performance within each academic goal area. Furthermore, every SUNY authorized charter school may propose additional, mission aligned goals and measures of success when crafting its Accountability Plan. The final Accountability Plan adopted by the school's board and approved by the Institute is included in the charter and frames the analysis of the school's student achievement results.

The Institute consistently emphasizes comparative and growth performance over absolute measures in its analysis of goal attainment. Nevertheless, the Institute analyzes every measure included in a school's Accountability Plan to determine its level of academic success, including the extent to which each school has established and maintained a record of high performance and demonstrated progress toward meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals throughout the charter term. Whether or not a school includes additional measures in its Accountability Plan, the Institute considers all available evidence of school performance at the time of renewal.

State assessment data in ELA, mathematics, and science in 3<sup>rd</sup> – 8<sup>th</sup> grade form the basis of data required to analyze the required accountability measures for elementary and middle schools. These data were not available in 2019-20 following the state's cancellation of all state exams during the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. Although schools participated in state assessments in ELA and mathematics in 2020-21, the participation rates that year were inconsistent. The resulting data is not sufficiently reliable or credible for cogent analyses of school academic performance. In response, the Institute provided all SUNY authorized charter schools a framework for the analysis of norm-referenced and internally developed exam data. To every extent possible, the Institute attempted to maintain a consistent framework of examining absolute, comparative, and growth performance. During 2019-20 and 2020-21, schools reported data on a variety of norm-referenced and internally developed assessments to demonstrate student academic success. This renewal report contemplates school performance during the pandemic through the lenses of absolute and growth performance on norm-referenced and internally developed ELA, mathematics, and science assessments along with high school completion and college readiness data.
