MISSION

The Bronx Charter School for Excellence prepares young people in New York City to compete for admission to and succeed in top public, private, and parochial high schools by cultivating their intellectual, artistic, social, emotional, and ethical development. The Bronx Charter School for Excellence accomplishes this by offering a challenging and rigorous academic curriculum, which at the earliest of grades has an eye toward college preparation. The Bronx Charter School for Excellence achieves this in a supportive and caring environment that maintains high expectations for all students.

EDUCATION CORPORATION BACKGROUND

The Bronx Charter School for Excellence education corporation ("Bronx Excellence Schools" or the "education corporation") has the authority to operate five charter schools. Bronx Charter School for Excellence ("Bronx Excellence"), the education corporation's flagship school, opened in fall of 2004 serving 100 students in Kindergarten and 1st grade. The education corporation began its expansion in New York in the fall of 2016 building on the successes and lessons learned after operating Bronx Excellence and posting high academic achievement for 12 years. The education corporation opened a new charter in each of the three successive

years for a total of five charter schools housed in seven sites. The five schools now serve students in the Morris Park, Parkchester, Wakefield, and Tremont communities in the Bronx. Bronx Excellence and Bronx Charter School for Excellence 2 ("Bronx Excellence 2") enroll students in Kindergarten – 8th grade. During subsequent charter terms, if granted, Bronx Charter School for Excellence 3 ("Bronx Excellence 3"), Bronx Charter School for Excellence 4 ("Bronx Excellence 4"), and Bronx Charter School for Excellence 5 ("Bronx Excellence 5") would continue expanding to serve students in Kindergarten – 8th grade. Bronx Excellence Schools contracts with Excellence Community Schools, Inc. ("Excellence Schools" or the "network"), a New York not-for-profit corporation and charter management organization ("CMO"), that supports each charter in the areas of curricular development, student assessment, recruitment of prospective students and staff members, professional development, legal compliance, external relations, financial management, and technology support. In addition to the five charter schools operating under Bronx Excellence Schools, Excellence Schools partners with one charter school in Stamford, Connecticut.

RENEWAL RECOMMENDATION

FULL-TERM RENEWAL

Renewal through 2028-29. The SUNY Charter Schools Institute (the "Institute") recommends the SUNY Trustees' Charter Schools Committee approve the five Applications for Charter Renewal:

- Bronx Charter School for Excellence;
- Bronx Charter School for Excellence 2;
- Bronx Charter School for Excellence 3;
- Bronx Charter School for Excellence 4; and,
- Bronx Charter School for Excellence 5.

If each school is renewed, Bronx Charter School for Excellence will be granted the authority to continue to operate each charter through July 31, 2029 with the authority to provide instruction to students in such configuration as set forth in each charter's Application for Renewal. The Institute makes this recommendation based on each charter meeting the criteria for renewal set forth in the Policies for the Renewal of Not-for-Profit Charter School Education Corporations and Charter Schools Authorized by the Board of Trustees of the State University of New York ("SUNY Renewal Policies").¹ The Table below presents more information about the schools.

The Institute further recommends the SUNY Trustees renew for a full term of five years the provisional charter of Bronx Excellence Schools, the New York not-for-profit charter school education corporation.

To earn an Initial Full-Term Renewal, a charter school must either:



have compiled a strong and compelling record of meeting or coming close to meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals, and have in place at the time of the renewal review an educational program that, as assessed using the Qualitative Education Benchmarks,² is generally effective; or,



have made progress toward meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals and have in place at the time of the renewal review an education program that, as assessed using the Qualitative Education Benchmarks, is particularly strong and effective.

RENEWAL RECOMMENDATION

To earn a **Subsequent Full-Term Renewal**, a charter must demonstrate that it has met or come close to meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals.

REQUIRED FINDINGS

In addition to making a recommendation based on a determination of whether the charter has met the SUNY Trustees' specific renewal criteria, the Institute makes the following findings required by the New York Charter Schools Act of 1998 (as amended, the "Act"):

the charter, as described in the Application for Charter Renewal, meets the requirements of the Act and all other applicable laws, rules, and regulations;

the education corporation can demonstrate the ability to operate the charter in an educationally and fiscally sound manner in the next charter term; and,

given the programs it will offer, its structure, and its purpose, approving the charter to operate for another five years is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes of the Act.³

As part of the corporate charter renewal review process and as required by Education Law §2851(4), the Institute reviewed the progress of each of the education corporation's operating schools in achieving the educational objectives set forth in their terms of operation in the education corporation's charter agreement. The Institute also reviewed detailed financial statements that disclosed the costs of administration, instruction, and other spending categories at each school operated by the education corporational capacity for each of the schools. Finally, the Institute reviewed the governance structure and finances of the education corporation. Elements of the foregoing constitute the Corporate Renewal Application. Based on this review and other information submitted to the Institute and in its files, the Institute makes the following findings required by the Act:

the charter school education corporation, as described in the Corporate Renewal Application, meets the requirements of the Act and all other applicable laws, rules, and regulations;

the education corporation can demonstrate the ability to operate its schools in an educationally and fiscally sound manner in the next charter term; and,

approving the education corporation to operate for another five years is likely to improve student learning and achievement and materially further the purposes of the Act.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Each school operated by Bronx Excellence Schools has a track record of meeting its Accountability Plan goals. The schools' high performance, driven by the organization's unwavering belief that every student can learn and achieve at high levels, is informed by precise, responsive data systems. The network provides leaders and teachers with timely and accurate assessment data analysis that drives instruction across all five schools. The schools use high quality curricular materials the effectiveness of which leaders monitor using careful observation and data analysis, revising the materials when necessary. School and network leaders scrutinize lesson plans and instructional delivery to ensure instruction meets the needs of every student in whole class and small group settings. Bronx Excellence and Bronx Excellence 2 each earned the National Blue Ribbon Award in 2012 and 2023, respectively.

Excellence Schools holds high expectations for performance and supports teachers and leaders to meet them. The network's innovative approach to professional adult learning requires participation from all leaders, teachers, and support staff members at the schools and the network. Leaders and teachers construct individualized plans within the network's professional learning framework to meet the required 100 hours of annual development time. Under this system, Excellence Schools effectively trains each adult in each charter and the network to take responsibility for their role in setting a positive school culture and creating a community of academic excellence.

Bronx Excellence Schools focuses on developing the whole child. The schools' rigorous academic program propels students to high achievement and acceptance into competitive high schools and colleges. The schools' family and community engagement ("FACE") team develops knowledge about the needs of families and communities and catalyzes the schools and the network to respond with additional resources, in-school programming and services, and extracurricular supports.

In addition to high academic achievement, Excellence Schools' Build The Bronx program supports teachers and leaders at the five schools to remove barriers that may stand in the way of students accessing their education, ensuring students are academically, socially, and emotionally prepared for the next step of their education journey, and supporting the families and communities surrounding each of the five schools. Build The Bronx is a set of initiatives addressing community and family wellness. Build The Bronx prioritizes family health and wellness, food security, and housing affordability through advocacy, direct investment in community services and businesses, and economic security through employment and advancement opportunities. The network effectively monitors correlations between community supports and achievement data, along with information about prevalent needs in the communities where the schools are located to ensure the effectiveness of these programs, and changes course quickly when necessary.

The schools' commitment to removing barriers to students' access to education, supporting families by creating community, and promoting the health of the local community set the stage for leaders and teachers to deliver a rigorous, effective educational program that supports many students to continue on to selective high school and, eventually, college programs. The information below demonstrates the key findings for the SUNY Trustees and highlights the successes of the charters.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

FINDINGS & INFORMATION

Is the education corporation an academic success?

Each school operated by Bronx Excellence Schools established a track record of meeting its Accountability Plan goals and is an academic success. In 2022-23, Bronx Excellence and Bronx Excellence 2 scored among the top 5% of more than 3,500 schools through New York State in English language arts ("ELA"). In mathematics, every school in the education corporation scored higher than 92% of schools statewide.

- Averaged together, Bronx Excellence Schools posted an effect size of 2.0 in ELA and 2.44 in mathematics in 2022-23, demonstrating the schools perform higher than expected to a large degree in comparison to schools throughout the state enrolling similar concentrations of economically disadvantaged students.
- Also in 2022-23, the schools met the growth target in ELA and mathematics. In mathematics, the schools posted an exemplary average growth percentile of 66.
- With 45% of students with disabilities scoring at or above proficiency on the state's ELA assessment for students in 3rd – 8th grade in 2022-23, the education corporation outscored the composite district by 30 percentage points.

Is the education corporation an effective, viable organization?

Bronx Excellence Schools, with support from Excellence Schools, effectively meets its mission. Each school provides students with rigorous high school and college preparatory educational experiences and supports families and community members socially, emotionally, and sometimes financially. The network's Build The Bronx initiative resources teams to ensure high student attendance, support to families facing social, emotional, and financial challenges, and removal of any barriers standing in the way of students accessing school. The network also provides students considering admission to boarding school and college immersion experiences that orient them to the experience of daily life and rigors of academic programs in those settings.

Is the education corporation fiscally sound?

Bronx Excellence Schools is fiscally sound based on the Institute's analysis of its renewal documentation. The education corporation has a long history of fiscal strength that can be attributed to a robust review and budgeting process involving all levels of network and school leadership. Each school kept its enrollment within 20% of the chartered enrollment projection and met budgeted revenue goals in the current charter term.

If the SUNY Trustees renew each charter, are the education corporation's plans for each charter reasonable, feasible, and achievable?

Bronx Excellence Schools' and Excellence Schools' plans for continuing to operate five schools in the Bronx is reasonable, feasible, and achievable. The existing programs will complete the current growth trajectory to fill out a full Kindergarten – 8th grade program at each charter school by 2026-27.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Based on the Institute's review of the education corporation's performance across each of its charters as posted over the charter term; a review of the Applications for Charter Renewal submitted by the education corporation for each of its charters; a review of academic, organizational, governance, and financial documentation; and, a renewal review of each of the charter's academic program, the Institute finds that the education corporation and each charter within it meets the required criteria for renewal.

The Institute recommends that the SUNY Trustees grant Bronx Excellence, Bronx Excellence 2, Bronx Excellence 3, and Bronx Excellence 4 each a Full-Term Subsequent Renewal through July 31, 2029; Bronx Excellence 5 an Initial Full-Term Renewal through July 31, 2029; and Bronx Excellence Schools' authority to operate the five schools through July 31, 2029.

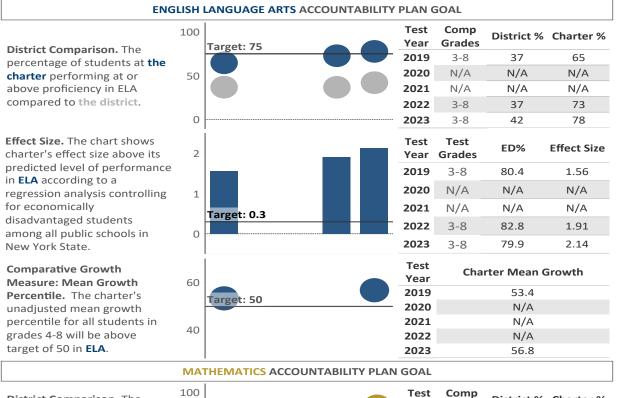

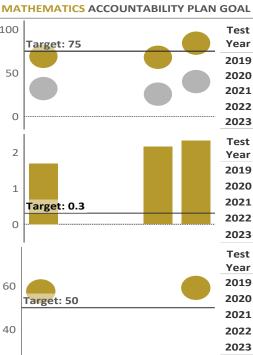

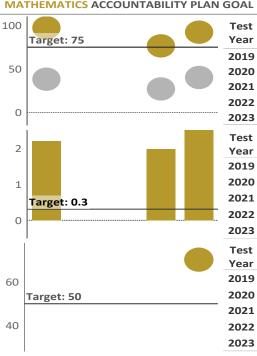

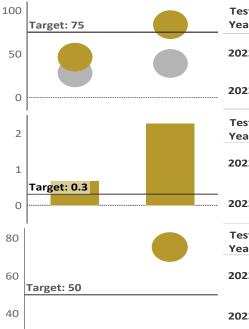


MATHEMATICS ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN GOAL

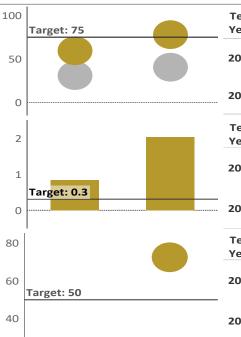

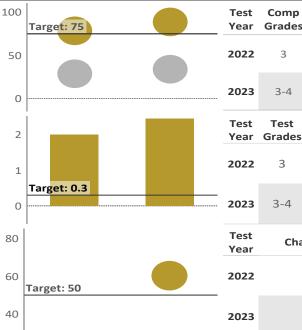

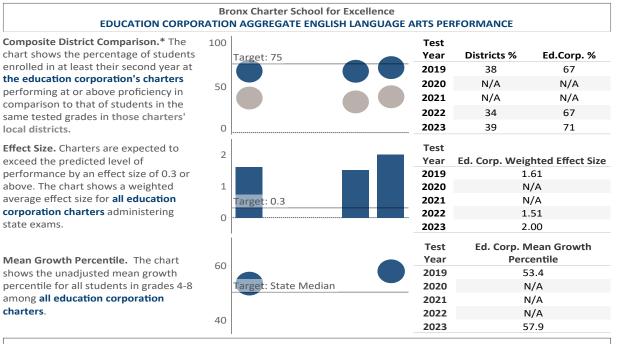

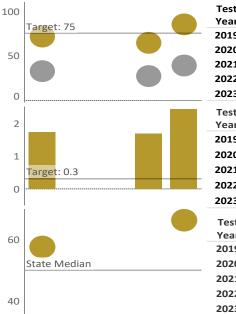

HAS THE EDUCATION CORPORATION MET OR COME CLOSE TO MEETING ITS ACADEMIC ACCOUNTABILITY PLAN GOALS?

Bronx Excellence Schools demonstrated superlative achievement over the charter term. The five schools under renewal review met their key academic Accountability Plan goals in every year with available data from 2018-19 through 2022-23. Notably in 2022-23, all five schools exceeded the targets for every measure under the mathematics goal. Each of the schools also met their science and Every Student Succeeds Act ("ESSA") goals.

In ELA, the five schools under renewal review met their goal and exceeded the targets for all comparative and growth measures. From 2018-19 through 2022-23, the schools' students enrolled in at least their second year scored at or above proficiency at rates that exceeded their districts by at least 17 percentage points each year. In comparison to schools across the state enrolling similar percentages of economically disadvantaged students, all five schools consistently performed higher than expected to a large degree. In every year with data available, Bronx Excellence Schools charters posted mean growth percentiles in ELA that exceeded the target of 50.

In mathematics, the five schools under renewal review met the goal in every year from 2018-19 through 2022-23. The schools outperformed their local districts and posted effect sizes that far surpassed the target in each year with data suitable for analysis. Notably in 2022-23, the schools' students enrolled in at least their second year posted proficiency rates that exceeded the absolute target of 75% and their district by at least 37 percentage points. Each school also demonstrated a record of high growth over the term posting mean growth percentiles above the target of 50. Notably in 2022-23, Bronx Excellence 3 posted a mean growth percentile of 75 in mathematics corroborating its 37 percentage point increase in mathematics proficiency from the prior year.

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

BENCHMARK SUMMARY

ASSESSMENT

Bronx Excellence Schools deploys a robust assessment system that improves instructional effectiveness and student learning. The system depends on collaboration between teachers, school leaders, and network leaders to execute careful, comprehensive analyses of data from multiple sources and design targeted strategies to close learning gaps. Leaders require the timely analysis of data and implementation of revised learning strategies to ensure lessons stay on pace throughout the year.

Across the five schools, network leaders create a variety of diagnostic, formative, and summative assessments from a repository of standards-aligned question items. These tests and quizzes, administered in all content areas across all schools, provide network-, school-, grade-, and classroom-level performance indicators teachers and leaders use to diagnose and rectify shortfalls in curricular materials, scope, sequence, pacing, and instructional delivery. School leaders, grade level teams, and teachers develop other formative assessments in the form of quick checks and exit tickets to monitor instructional effectiveness on a day-to-day basis. Teachers and school leaders use these data to identify students who may need additional support and classroom level topics for re-teaching. Bronx Excellence Schools also uses the Fountas & Pinnell Benchmark Assessment System ("F&P") in the same effective manner already described to monitor reading progress and ensure literacy instruction meets student needs.

CURRICULUM

Excellence Schools provides each school with comprehensive curricular resources to support teachers with instructional planning. For ELA, elementary level teachers utilize Into Reading and middle school level teachers implement the Into Literature curriculum. In mathematics, the schools utilize Eureka Math² for the elementary and middle school programs. The science program aligns to Next Generation Science Standards with the use of the Amplify curriculum. Each school has a systematized process in which teachers create and submit weekly lesson plans to academic deans and content area specialists for feedback. In lower elementary grades, teachers rehearse lessons regularly with one another for immediate feedback. In other grades, leaders work with teachers during grade level meetings to review and discuss lesson plans. These cohesive systems for developing, reviewing, and delivering high quality lessons allow leaders and teachers to meet the specific learning needs of each student because they are based on standards aligned, research based curricular programs and informed by a robust assessment system that provides accurate data aligned to the rigor of state performance standards. Network level staff members collect feedback from each school annually regarding the implementation of the curricular programs and make adjustments as necessary. In addition to the core content areas, Bronx Excellence Schools offers a wide range of additional courses to benefit students in the arts and other areas, including computer science courses where students learn coding and application design. The education corporation also offers many extracurricular activities including sports, learning from leaders at Google and Amazon, and access to a summer STEM program at Colgate University.

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

Bronx Excellence Schools also supports students to prepare for the transition to high school. The schools provide every middle school student with high school preparation courses that develop test taking strategies, essay writing skills, and interviewing techniques, all of which target admissions to specialized high school programs in New York City and beyond. The network has a track record of supporting students' successful applications to district specialized high schools, elite private schools, boarding schools, and specialized high school prep programs, such as Prep for Prep.

PEDAGOGY

High quality instruction is evident across all Bronx Excellence Schools. Lessons are purposeful and each contains a clear, standards aligned objective and a seamless flow of activities. Teachers consistently monitor student learning through question prompts, student to student conversations, and meaningful written work. Each lesson includes a culminating exit ticket to check for understanding, and teachers plan scripted lessons with specific details on how to adjust instruction based on student responses. Lessons also challenge students with opportunities for higher order thinking. Teachers not only ask students to explain their own or peers' thinking, but also ask students to elaborate on ideas previously presented. As much as is possible, teachers prompt students to relate learning to real life situations and foster students' depth of understanding. Across all five charter schools, teachers continually focus students' attention on academic attainment. Classrooms are well resourced to help facilitate learning. Teachers utilize various effective techniques, like countdown timers, to instill a sense of urgency and maintain an appropriate pace for learning.

INSTRUCTIONAL LEADERSHIP

Bronx Excellence Schools has systems and structures in place to establish consistently strong instructional leadership within and across the schools. Leaders' unwavering expectations and belief that all students can succeed drives decisions about professional development and other supports for teachers, instilling a sense of high expectations for academic achievement throughout the school communities. Leaders reiterate these expectations through clear messaging and by holding teachers accountable for meeting concrete performance targets.

The education corporation's elementary and middle school programs each have principals and academic deans to support teaching and learning. Leaders have clear structures in place for supporting teachers including frequent, differentiated observation and feedback cycles, grade team meetings, and professional development. Leaders provide timely, actionable feedback to teachers based on assessment data to drive the quality of instruction. On an annual basis, leaders set specific priorities tailored to each school's needs. Network leaders support principals by providing opportunities for collaboration and sharing across schools. The schools' resulting overall academic achievement is high with each school meeting its key academic Accountability Plan goals.

Excellence Schools requires all adults in the organization to commit to an innovative professional learning program designed by network leaders. The program requires 100 hours of learning from each participant each year. School and network leaders use direct observation and guided reflection sessions to understand how professional development experiences manifest in lessons and school culture. Each participant proposes a

self-directed course of learning activities that accounts for prior experience, current professional goals, and external learning commitments already in place (e.g., graduate courses and other degree programs fulfill a requirement for the professional learning program.) Examples of acceptable activities are approved self study courses, completing learning modules, workshops, or seminars designed and offered by Excellence Schools throughout the year, designing and delivering staff development to colleagues at Bronx Excellence Schools, or publishing a scholarly article or book. This carefully curated series of activities develops teachers' and leaders' understanding of how they can leverage personal mastery, mental models, and shared vision to shape school culture and a community of excellence.

AT-RISK

Bronx Excellence Schools has programs in place to meet the educational needs of students struggling academically, students with disabilities, and ELLs. The network director of student services provides clear oversight and support to ensure each program is compliant and high quality. Each school has defined systems for identifying subgroups of students including a clear referral process to the Response to Intervention ("RTI") program, precise procedures for referring students for special education services through the district Committee on Special Education ("CSE"), and proper systems for evaluating students' English proficiency level to determine ELL status. The schools infuse intervention work throughout the day and teachers review student formative data to adjust teaching and learning. The schools dedicate time in the schedule for intervention and small group work. Starting in 2021-22, Bronx Excellence Schools began enlisting individual volunteers from each school's respective community to establish and create a tutor corps, partnering students with community volunteers during a tutoring period to help students with specific content area needs.

For students with disabilities, each charter provides Special Education Teacher Support Services ("SETSS"), Integrated Co-Teaching ("ICT") classrooms, and other related services. For ELLs, the charters implement an English immersion program that integrates listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills into the general ELA program with specific targeted supports for ELLs. Teachers regularly conduct progress monitoring through each school's assessment system. The network provides consistent and high quality professional development to support teachers with strategies for elevating the achievement of each subgroup of students. All these supports and efforts, including the schools' culture of vigilant caring and responsibility for students, have led to high achievement for both students with disabilities and ELLs. In 2022-23, two Bronx Excellence Schools with New York State testing results for students with disabilities far exceeded the district's and state's proficiency rates in both ELA and mathematics for all students at grade level.

ORGANIZATIONAL CAPACITY

Bronx Excellence Schools and Excellence Schools established an organizational structure that works effectively to deliver the educational program by engaging families and surrounding communities to remove barriers that may challenge students' and the schools' success. Regular and frequent communications with families, community, and partner organizations along with careful monitoring of academic, fiscal, and social emotional health data provide leaders with the information they need to think strategically about meeting student and family needs.

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

Build The Bronx is a set of initiatives addressing community and family wellness. The program prioritizes family health and wellness, food security, and housing affordability through advocacy, direct investment in community services and businesses. As part of Build The Bronx, Excellence Schools employs and offers advancement opportunities to community members purposefully. Current school and network employees include alumni, parents, and community members. Some community members employed through Build The Bronx initiatives are retired and offer students opportunities to develop important intergenerational connections. Build the Bronx also connects Bronx Excellence families and other community members with physical and mental health services through various institutional partnerships.

At the network level, leaders create a robust support structure to ensure each school and principal has support and resources to run each charter effectively. The network provides academic, operational, analytic, financial, talent recruitment, development, marketing, human resources, and student advancement supports to each school. The network and each school clearly delineates operational roles and responsibilities, ensuring principals and instructional leaders can primarily focus on the academic program. The network and schools ensure clear reporting lines and staff members know who to go to for what.

Excellence Schools establishes clear pathways for employees to develop into leadership roles. The schools and network have high rates of retention and long employee tenures. Excellence Schools invests in its people and the quality of the schools' leadership by providing extensive, meaningful professional development opportunities and incentivizing teachers and leaders to earn graduate degrees. The network provides residency opportunities for teachers to grow into instructional leaders at one of the schools or the network. Excellence Schools intentionally recruits school support staff and teachers, when appropriate, from Bronx Excellence Schools families and the surrounding community. Leaders credit this approach when describing strong family loyalty to the schools and the overall mission.

Bronx Excellence Schools provides students with resources that support successful learning. For instance, Bronx Excellence Schools' two to one laptop program, where each student has access to a laptop at school and one at home, reduces the burden of transporting materials to and from school. To direct and inspire students, the network subsidizes an immersion program at Colgate University designed to provide students a close-toreal-life experience of attending college or a rigorous boarding high school. During the charter term, Bronx Excellence Schools experienced the effects of shortages of teachers, counselors, and social workers during and following the COVID-19 pandemic. Still, the schools continue to hire additional social workers to provide mandated and as-needed counseling for students and meet the overall increased need for mental health support.

Bronx Excellence Schools created the FACE team with the goal of removing any barriers to learning. The FACE team maintains constant contact with families, connecting them with resources and setting goals to ensure each home environment is conducive to the child's well being, learning, and development. The collective, systematic, and coordinated efforts of the entire organization effectively support student learning and family health and wellness.

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

BOARD OVERSIGHT & GOVERNANCE

The Bronx Excellence Schools board works effectively to achieve each school's Accountability Plan goals. The board successfully provides oversight and governance to the five schools operated by the education corporation and manages its contract with Excellence Schools. With replication, the education corporation board has built its processes to focus on engaging primarily with Excellence Schools' leadership to hold the CMO accountable for running the schools. The CMO and board agreed on reporting structures that allow network leaders to report on each school, which leaves principals and school-based staff members to focus primarily on delivering an excellent educational program. The board is strategic in requesting, analyzing, and acting on data the network presents at monthly meetings. The board reviews a wide range of data including academic, operational, and financial information to make decisions and engage with external partners to build its skills as it has evolved over the past few years.

The board materially and substantially implements, maintains, and abides by appropriate policies, systems, and processes to ensure the effective governance and oversight of the education corporation. It regularly reviews and updates policies, avoids conflicts of interest, and implements a process for handling complaints. Continually abiding by its bylaws, the board reflected on its diversity and continues to seek members from each community where schools are located.

COMPLIANCE REPORTING

HAS EACH CHARTER DUE FOR RENEWAL SUBSTANTIALLY COMPLIED WITH APPLICABLE LAWS, RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND PROVISIONS OF ITS CHARTER?

The education corporation substantially complies with applicable laws, rules and regulations, and provisions of its charter. During the current charter term, the education corporation demonstrates a clear record of compliance with the terms of its charter including the timely submission of required reporting to the Institute.

Annual Reports	The education corporation submitted its annual reports to the Institute and NYSED on time. While the education corporation has posted portions of the annual report each year, it has not posted the independent financial audits. The Institute will work with the education corporation to ensure it posts every part of the annual reports prior to the start of the next charter term.
Code of Ethics/Conflict of Interest Policy	At the time of the renewal submission, the education corporation's code of ethics and conflicts of interest policies were missing several required components. The Institute is working with the education corporation to ensure a more comprehensive policy is adopted.
Complaints	The Institute received one formal complaint regarding Bronx Excellence 2 alleging the school failed to implement paraprofessional services per a student's Individualized Education Program and did not appropriately implement the discipline policy for a student with a disability at Bronx Excellence 2. The Institute found the district's committee on special education ("CSE") did not hold a manifestation determination in a timely fashion resulting in the student being suspended for more than 10 days without such determination in violation of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. The Institute also found the district did not provide paraprofessional services in a timely fashion. Although the school was able to obtain services from an outside provider, a delay in service provision spurred the school to advise the CSE reconvene to determine the appropriate amount of compensatory services.
Personnel Policies	The school's Personnel Policies require minor revision specifying all criminal background checks will be reviewed by two or more employees as required by the charter agreement. The Institute will work with the school to revise these policies prior to the next charter term.

COMPLIANCE REPORTING

Teacher Certification

The Act allows charters to hire up to 15 uncertified lead teachers contingent upon those teachers meeting certain requirements including: two years of Teach for America experience; three years of teaching experience; status as a higher education professor; exceptional experience in a subject; or, teaching science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) or career and technical education courses.

The network's centralized talent and recruitment team screens candidates for appropriate qualifications while the human resources team monitors and supports teachers' certification status once employed. The network pipelines talent through its Build the Bronx initiative focusing on hiring community members to become lifelong educators based on the belief that people who reside in the community are more invested in the schools and students succeeding. The Build the Bronx program is establishing itself as a major employer in the community stimulating economic and community growth. The network has active partnerships with Monroe College and New York University's Steinhardt School of Culture, Education, and Human Development placing students in the schools for field placements, practicums, residencies, fellowships, or student teaching hours. Once these students graduate, the network may hire them as education associates, positioning them to advance to lead teachers and leadership positions.

At the time of the renewal review, Bronx Excellence employed 36 lead teachers. Of the 36 lead teachers, 21 were uncertified including six over the allowable limit. All 21 uncertified teachers met the appropriate qualifications under the Act.

At the time of the renewal review, Bronx Excellence 2 employed 21 lead teachers. Of the 21 lead teachers, 16 were uncertified including one over the allowable limit. Of the 16 uncertified teachers, 15 meet the appropriate qualifications under the Act.

At the time of the renewal review, Bronx Excellence 3 employed 24 lead teachers. Of the 24 lead teachers, 19 were uncertified including four over the allowable limit. Of the 19 uncertified teachers, 16 meet the appropriate qualifications under the Act.

At the time of the renewal review, Bronx Excellence 4 employed 15 lead teachers. Of the 15 lead teachers, nine were uncertified which is within the allowable limit. Of the nine uncertified teachers, eight meet the appropriate qualifications under the Act.

At the time of the renewal review, Bronx Excellence 5 employed 11 lead teachers. Of the 11 lead teachers, six were uncertified which is within the allowable limit. Of the six uncertified teachers, four meet the appropriate qualifications under the Act.

COMMUNITY SATISFACTION

To report on parent satisfaction with the charter's program, the Institute used satisfaction survey data, information gathered from parents representing a cross section of students, and data regarding persistence in enrollment.

Parent Survey Data	The Institute compiled data from the New York City Department of Education's ("NYCDOE's") annual family survey from the 2022-23 school year for each school due for renewal. In 2022-23, 88% of families who received the NYCDOE survey responded. Of the families who responded, 95% expressed satisfaction with the charters.
Parent Feedback	Excellence Schools and Bronx Excellence Schools staff members routinely collect satisfaction information and critical feedback from parents using frequent, multiple contact points. The parent association serves to increase parent participation in the school community. This parent-based initiative spearheads fundraisers, schoolwide cultural events, and picture day. Parent education workshops inform and provide parents with the necessary tools to continue to facilitate student learning at home. The FACE team provides an effective communication channel between parents and all levels of the Bronx Excellence Schools and Excellence Schools organizations.
	The effectiveness of these efforts is evident in three data points at each of the five schools. Each school posts a daily attendance rate over 90%. Student retention rates at the schools are also high. Bronx Excellence re-enrolled 92% of eligible students, Bronx Excellence 2 re-enrolled 90%, Bronx Excellence 3 re-enrolled 88%, and Bronx Excellence 4 re-enrolled 86%. Bronx Excellence 5 re-enrolled 65% of its students after experiencing the most significant effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Most families left the school because they moved out of the area or New York City.
Public Comments	In accordance with the Act, the Institute notified the district in which the charter is located regarding the Application for Charter Renewal. The full text of any written comments received from the district appears below, which also includes a summary of any public comments.
	The NYCDOE held its required hearings on all five of the Bronx Excellence School's charters' renewal applications on October 24, 2023, by joint videoconference. The Bronx Excellence 2 school principal spoke in support of the renewal application and shared that the school focuses on the intellectual, artistic, social, emotional, and ethical development of its students through its rigorous academic curriculum, early college preparation, supportive and caring environment, and high expectations. No one spoke in opposition to the renewal application.
	There were no public comments regarding the four other charters' applications.

COMMUNITY SATISFACTION

Persistence in EnrollmentAn additional indicator of parent satisfaction is persistence in enrollment. In 2022-23,
87% of Bronx Excellence Schools students returned from the previous year. Student
persistence data from previous years of the charter term is available in student
demographics section of the report. Besides commendable retention rates, each charter
school operated by the Bronx Excellence Schools education corporation maintains a wait
list. After 2022-23, the wait list at Bronx Excellence was 1,036 students, the largest wait
list in the education corporation, and Bronx Excellence 5 maintained a wait list of 185
students, the smallest wait list among the five charter schools.

The Institute derived the statistical information on persistence in enrollment from its database. No comparative data from the NYCDOE or the NYSED is available to the Institute to provide either district or statewide context.

STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

ENROLLMENT AND RETENTION TARGETS

As required by Education Law § 2851(4)(e), a charter must include in its renewal application information regarding the efforts it will put in place to meet or exceed SUNY's enrollment and retention targets for students with disabilities, ELLs, and students who are eligible applicants for the federal Free and Reduced Price Lunch ("FRPL") program. The Institute examines each school's progress toward meeting or coming close to meeting its targets over the charter term as well as the efforts it has and will put in place to meet or continue to meet those targets.

Bronx Excellence Schools makes good faith efforts to meet or exceed the enrollment and retention targets for each school. With support from Excellence Schools, the schools conduct the following recruitment and retention efforts:

- Posting on Bronx Excellence Schools' website, filing announcements in local newspapers, using active social media accounts and other public outlets to broadcast enrollment options for the schools;
- Attending open houses, public meetings, meet-and-greets, and presentations at various community organizations such as preschools, daycare centers, head start programs;;
- Advertising on public transit lines serving the local community;
- Distributing flyers and applications in English, Spanish, and prevailing languages;
- Advertising on local media outlets (newspapers, radio, and internet) that target both English and non-English speaking audiences and free publications distributed in economically disadvantaged communities;
- Utilizing bilingual staff members and translation service providers to support recruiting efforts for prospective families whose native language is one other than English;
- Informing families of our dedicated student support services department designed to advance the achievement of our students with disabilities; and,
- Hosting "family chats" with individual families upon enrollment to discuss expectations, student needs, and how Bronx Excellence will address them, particularly for families of students with disabilities and English language learners.



FISCAL ANALYSIS

IS THE EDUCATION CORPORATION FISCALLY SOUND?

Bronx Charter School for Excellence is fiscally sound as are its charters, Bronx Charter School for Excellence, Bronx Charter School for Excellence 2, Bronx Charter School for Excellence 3, and Bronx Charter School for Excellence 4, based on the Institute's analysis of the fiscal evidence collected through the renewal review. The SUNY Fiscal Dashboard presents color-coded tables and charts indicating that each charter up for renewal and the education corporation have demonstrated fiscal soundness over the majority of the charter term.⁴

The fiscal dashboard for each charter and the merged education corporation can be found at the end of this section. The discussion that follows relates mainly to the Bronx Charter School for Excellence because a charter is not a legally distinct fiscal entity.

Bronx Excellence Schools has a long history of operating fiscally sound schools with high quality educational programs. Bronx Excellence opened in the 2004-05 school year and served the Bronx community for two full charter terms before the education corporation decided to begin its network expansion into other schools in the third charter term. Throughout the expansion, the board, school leaders, and finance teams budgeted effectively ensuring each school's enrollment revenue independently covered liabilities. The board and school leaders work closely to create budgets and monitor spending and expenses at least five times a year at board meetings.

The network benefits from leased facility locations where the renovations have already been completed. These locations provide adequate space for the current schools with room for growth during the next charter term. Bronx Excellence Schools purchased two buildings on adjacent parcels of land in 2013 with bond financing, which was recently paid off. The drop in the network's fiscal responsibility score within the attached dashboard can be attributed to increased liabilities noted on the 2022-23 audit. The liability increase is due to Bronx Excellence Schools' adoption of ASC 842, a lease accounting standard created by the Financial Accounting Standard Board (FASB), which requires balance sheets to reflect all leases longer than 12 months and is not cause for concern to the Institute. Bronx Excellence Schools reported \$51.2 million in net assets and 1.7 months of cash on hand to cover short-term liabilities. Bronx Excellence Schools deposited the required amount in a separate account in the event of dissolution.

4. The U.S. Department of Education has established fiscal criteria for certain ratios or information with high – medium – low categories, represented in the table as green – gray – red. FUTURE PLANS

IF THE SUNY TRUSTEES RENEW THE EDUCATION CORPORATION'S AUTHORITY TO OPERATE EACH CHARTER DUE FOR RENEWAL, ARE ITS PLANS FOR THE CHARTERS REASONABLE, FEASIBLE, AND ACHIEVABLE?

Bronx Excellence Schools and Excellence Schools established and maintain an effective educational program supported by a comprehensive and robust set of community supports. The education corporation will continue to grow the grade levels of Bronx Excellence 3, Bronx Excellence 4, and Bronx Excellence 5 until they serve the full complement of Kindergarten – 8th grade by 2026-27. As such, the education corporation's plans for the next charter term, including the plan to continue grade level growth, are reasonable, feasible, and achievable.

BRONX EXCELLENCE SCHOOLS

Plans for the Charter's Structure. The education corporation has provided all of the key structural elements for a charter renewal and those elements are reasonable, feasible, and achievable.

Plans for Board Oversight & Governance. Current board members express interest in continuing to serve the charter in the next term.

Fiscal Plans. Bronx Excellence Schools has presented a thorough and conservative budget plan with reasonable projections of revenue and expenses for the upcoming charter term. All the schools within the network have been successful in generating enough revenue to cover expenses throughout the current charter, and the projection over the next five-year term predicts the same. The network will be moving Bronx 2 middle school out of it's temporary location with Bronx 5 and into a consolidated middle school location. The board and school leaders addressed these adjustments and financially planned for this change within the budget.

BRONX EXCELLENCE

Plans for the Educational Program. The school plans to continue implementing the same core elements of its strong educational program.

Facility Plans. Bronx Excellence will continue to serve the Kindergarten – 8th grade program in its privately owned, Silver Certified Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) facility. The facility comprises two adjacent buildings joined through a construction and renovation project and provides both indoor and outdoor space to accommodate the program through a subsequent charter term, if granted. The school recently paid off its bond financing for the facility site originally purchased in 2013.

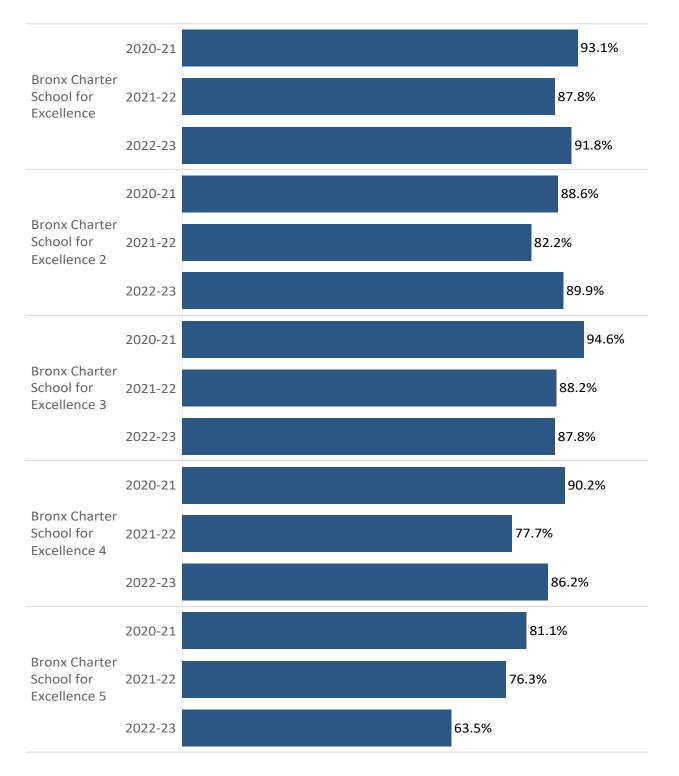

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IS THE SCHOOL AN ACADEMIC SUCCESS? THE INFORMATION BELOW HIGHLIGHTS THE INSTITUTE'S AND SUNY TRUSTEES' APPROACH TO ACCOUNTABILITY PLANS FOR EACH SUNY AUTHORIZED CHARTER SCHOOL.

At the beginning of the Accountability Period,³ the school developed and adopted an Accountability Plan that set academic goals for performance in the key subjects of ELA and mathematics, as well as science and the federal Every Student Succeeds Act ("ESSA"). High school Accountability Plans also include goals for High School Graduation, College Preparation, and Social Studies. For each goal in the Accountability Plan, specific outcome measures define the level of performance necessary to meet that goal. The Institute examines results for all required Accountability Plan measures to determine goal attainment. The Act requires charters be held "accountable for meeting measurable student achievement results"⁴ and states the educational programs at a charter school must "meet or exceed the student performance standards adopted by the board of regents"⁵ for other public schools. SUNY's required accountability measures that present schools':

ABSOLUTE PERFORMANCE, I.E., WHAT PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS SCORE AT A CERTAIN PROFICIENCY ON STATE EXAMS? COMPARATIVE PERFOR-MANCE, I.E., HOW DID THE SCHOOL DO AS COMPARED TO SCHOOLS IN THE DISTRICT AND SCHOOLS THAT SERVE SIMILAR POPULATIONS OF ECO-NOMICALLY DISADVAN-TAGED STUDENTS? GROWTH PERFORMANCE, I.E., HOW MUCH DID THE SCHOOL GROW STUDENT PERFORMANCE AS COMPARED TO THE GROWTH OF SIMILARLY SITUATED STUDENTS?

Absolute, comparative, and growth achievement provide a basis for triangulating school performance within each academic goal area. Furthermore, every SUNY authorized charter school may propose additional, mission aligned goals and measures of success when crafting its Accountability Plan. The final Accountability Plan adopted by the school's board and approved by the Institute is included in the charter and frames the analysis of the school's student achievement results.

The Institute consistently emphasizes comparative and growth performance over absolute measures in its analysis of goal attainment. Nevertheless, the Institute analyzes every measure included in a school's Accountability Plan to determine its level of academic success, including the extent to which each school has established and maintained a record of high performance and demonstrated progress toward meeting its academic Accountability Plan goals throughout the charter term. Whether or not a school includes additional measures in its Accountability Plan, the Institute considers all available evidence of school performance at the time of renewal.

3. Because the SUNY Trustees make a renewal decision before student achievement results for the final year of a charter term become available, the Accountability Period ends with the school year prior to the final year of the charter term. For a school in a subsequent charter term, the Accountability Period covers the final year of the previous charter term and ends with the school year prior to the final year of the current charter term. In this renewal report, the Institute uses "charter term" and "Accountability Period" interchangeably.

APPENDIX C: REPORT INFORMATION

State assessment data in ELA, mathematics, and science in 3rd — 8th grade form the basis of data required to analyze the required accountability measures for elementary and middle schools. These data were not available in 2019-20 following the state's cancellation of all state exams during the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. Although schools participated in state assessments in ELA and mathematics in 2020-21, the participation rates that year were inconsistent. The resulting data is not sufficiently reliable or credible for cogent analyses of school academic performance. In response, the Institute provided all SUNY authorized charter schools a framework for the analysis of norm-referenced and internally developed exam data. To every extent possible, the Institute attempted to maintain a consistent framework of examining absolute, comparative, and growth performance. During 2019-20 and 2020-21, schools reported data on a variety of norm-referenced and internally developed assessments to demonstrate student academic success. This renewal report contemplates school performance during the pandemic through the lenses of absolute and growth performance on norm-referenced and internally developed ELA, mathematics, and science assessments along with high school completion and college readiness data.
